One of our yachts recently had a man overboard at sea during a race and although the crew member was recovered uninjured. The incident highlighted once again the risks associated with sailing and Yachting Australia's stand regarding man overboard drills.

The Special Regulations handbook (R.R.S. 6.012) recommends that crew members be trained in man overboard drills, and that these drills be carried out at reasonable intervals. Information on Quick stop and Life Sling (Seattle Sling) can be found in Part 1 Advisory, Appendix C of this volume.

Doing a web search will locate a long list of sites with relevant points and valuable information. I was particularly impressed by the following site which contains clear, easy to follow step by step instructions, as well as simple clear diagrams.



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Docklines

December was relatively quiet on NCYC's marina (many long termers chose to visit other destinations for holiday plus our usual monthly delivery from the USA was delayed until January 2012). The new year started with a proverbial bang as we had many visiting vessels from Lake Macquarie and Pittwater sampling the hospitality of our facility and enjoying the harbour entertainment and fireworks over the New Year's Eve weekend.

January remained strong all month. Many coastal cruisers stopped over and even extended their stay to enjoy our facility and Newcastle. We have also had a number of racing yachts stop over on their return trips from the Hobart and Coffs Harbour races. We were glad to berth the IMOCA 60 "Hugo Boss" while she prepared for a promotional trip to China and thank Simon and the Hugo Boss crew for the very successful open day during which NCYC members and the general public could inspect the yacht.

Other notable visitors during January included the two old Americas Cup 12m yachts KA 5 "Australia" and KA14 "Steak N Kidney" plus 100 footer "Wild Thing" (24' draft) on the end of C finger, the Warren 90 "Kalm" on the end of A finger plus the beautiful Shipman 63 on the end of D finger which was waiting to be loaded on her ship back Europe.

During late January we had 22 boats arrive by ship from the USA which saw A finger full as well as other club berths being utilised to accommodate the imported vessels. Some of these boats stayed for a while to take advantage of the marine services offerred on our facility before they headed for their home port.

On Saturday 4 February 2012 we successfully hosted a large fleet of game boats who were contesting a fishing tournament run by the Lake Macquarie Game Fishing Club .The boats arrived late evening allowing the crews a chance to relax and refresh at NCYC before departing early on Sunday morning for another days fishing. The feedback from fleet regarding NCYC's facility and hospitality has been very positive.

Our marina has a premium listing in the Australian Marina Guide (www.marinasguide.com.au). This is aimed at promoting our facility to the many coastal cruisers who travel around our country. The site has over 110,000 individual users each year who use it to plan their coastal trips and choose ports at which to stop.

Thank you to all the boat owners who have tidied up around their berth and kept their hoses along with other equipment on their boats. There are still a few to be cleaned up, but overall our marina looks much more presentable and is safer to walk along. Your assistance in keeping our marina safe, clean and tidy is much appreciated . Just a few friendly reminders

- 1. It is illegal to use the fire hoses for cleaning boats and filling tanks. These hoses are on the marina as a safety requirement and should not be used for any other purpose than fire fighting. Heavy fines can be applied if you get caught using them illegally.
- 2. Could all yacht owners remember to tie their halyards away from the mast or run a mouse line to eliminate rattling. A little courtesy to the people sleeping on nearby boats and landlubbers in the marina apartments will be greatly appreciated.
- 3. Please keep the noise levels down if socialising on your boat overnight. We have had a number of valid complaints.
- 4. Following receipt of your certificate of currency of insurance please drop a copy up to the office or scan and email to dockmaster@ncyc.net.au. It is a requirement of our marina that you provide us with



a copy of your insurance.

Once again, if you have any queries please don't hesitate to come and see me or the Dock Masters. All the best for the remainder of the summer boating season.

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2011 EMYR Crusade

Edition III – The transition from Lebanon to Israel and Haifa, Galilee

The EMYR Rally began in Istanbul 5 weeks earlier and visited 10 marinas in Turkey, Cyprus and Beirut in company with 50 yachts from 16 countries. Previous articles detailed the fantastic hospitality and organised tours to major historical and cultural sites.

Our next sail was 70 Nm as the crow flies but traversed some major cultural and political differences and a convoluted route as we travelled from Beirut in Lebanon to Haifa in Israel.

As usual, military precision was necessary to herd 50 private yacht skippers who were on notice that we were in a scenario that was not to be taken lightly. The rally was given a corridor to follow which headed straight out to sea to the 6 nm line then headed south outside that 6nm line and then turned into the designated corridor to Haifa.

To satisfy Lebanese officialdom all our documentation stated that we were sailing back to Cyprus. We may not have been allowed to leave had we indicated we were going to Israel.

In cruising mode it seemed it was a simple case of heading south to the nominated way-point except some skippers didn't consider that the land protruded out so several boats including 4th Dimension were mentioned in dispatches from the Lebanese navy about how they should rectify their position quickly.

As we crossed seaward of the border we noticed several patrol boats in the distance. One minute later the Israeli navy were alongside with the support of a fighter jet. On the patrol boat the forward cannons were not manned but the aft gun was, with intent.

The question was asked whether we had guns on board. Deb thought that was slightly amusing which prompted the response "We are afraid of you – we do not know who you are – you may have bombs on board and be planning to blow us up" – the tone removed the grin from Deb's face.

They required everyone on board to line up along the gunwale facing them and place the boat papers and our passports into a netting scoop on a long pole extended from the patrol boat for review. They then came on board to search the boat. Unfortunately Deb (again) left the main door to the bathroom locked and exited through the cabin.

A locked door did not please the searchers and skipper Len had to go down below and explain. Deb was allowed into Israel this time on the basis she promised not to come back.

From Haifa the rally organised a day trip to the Sea of Galilee. There was an offer of a baptism in the Jordan River but all the yachties deemed they get baptised enough at sea. A home visit for dinner with a local sailing family was another great experience. As would be expected in a country that exports technology, the father was a rocket scientist with the military and all members of the family had university degrees or higher. Their home was modest by Australian standards as housing is extremely expensive in Israel. The discussions were open and gave a great insight into all aspects of Israel and their views of a future inclusive Israel for the benefit and security of all parties.

Our time in Israel exposed to us the complexity of issues that they face. When we travelled on buses and trains, there were always young Israelis doing their compulsory military service with their guns and bullet clips over their shoulders. It was a surreal reminder of a different world.

In the next edition we sail to Ashkelon Marina, 5 miles from Gaza.

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Handling the Harbour Traffic

There has been much excitement generated by the news that on Tuesday 27 March 2012, Newcastle Port Corporation Pilot, Captain Malcolm Goodfellow will present on "Safety Information for Recreational Boating When Operating in Proximity to Commercial Shipping at the Port of Newcastle".

Following Captain Goodfellow's presentation early in 2006, in September of the same year an invaluable A5 booklet was published: "SAFETY INFORMATION For Recreational Boating When Operating In Proximity To Commercial Shipping At The Port Of Newcastle". This publication was jointly funded by Newcastle Port Corporation and NSW Maritime and included many clearly relevant illustrations making for interesting reading.

The booklet was prepared by the late George Keegan OAM, Club Captain-Secretary of Newcastle Cruising Yacht Club and materials and information included in the publication was sourced from both funding organisations.

Valuable input was provided by former Harbour Master Captain Timothy Turner and Pilot Captain Malcolm Goodfellow, NSW Maritime Regional Manager Charlie Dunkley and Boating Services Officer Phil Howe, who has since retired. Since 2006, Phil has maintained his involvement with the local boating community, taking on the responsibility of on-water coordinator for the National Maritime Festivals.

The establishment of NCYC resulted in a significant increase in recreational boating in the port of Newcastle, necessitating further education of the boating public. Discussions between the Club, NSW Maritime and Newcastle Port Corporation resulted in the delivery of an outstanding presentation to NCYC members by Captain Goodfellow.

The excellent slideshow and accompanying commentary delivered by Captain Goodfellow caused many to be amazed by lack of clear vision that ship captains have, of yachts and power boats they share the harbour with.

Subsequent to the presentation, Harbour Master Turner made arrangements for a number of our skippers to separately be taken by helicopter to an incoming ship to experience first-hand the complexities of piloting a ship



Local Maritime History

On 21st December 2011, the Maritime Centre was involved in filming a segment for a History Channel/BBC production with presenter Tony Robinson. On behalf of NCYC, prior to the day of filming, Ernie Thirkell and Mike Eggleston helped them with their butcher boat, which had dried out through being on dry land for a number of years. The historic craft was secured at NCYC marina, partially submerged (to allow the wood to rehydrate), and a watchful eye was kept on it. Committee vessel "George Keegan" was support vessel during the filming. The program is due to air in June 2012.

Forgacs Parade of Lights

Solution: There are two different tacks that you might take to hopefully reach a safe haven. Both involve playing on diamonds immediately. You need to find the outstanding diamonds no worse than 4-2. So, play ace, king and another diamond. West will win and return a trump. Overtake dummy's queen with your ace and ruff (trump) your fourth diamond with the trump king in dummy. At this juncture you can either try cashing the heart ace or take the club finesse. Which should it be?

The club finesse is better as West's opening lead was very likely a singleton. After the club finesse you play your trumps from the top to come home with a wet sail.

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
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
