The Club and its members have been busy over the past few months and I would like to outline some of the activities that the Club has hosted and events our members have been

involved in.

I would like to personally congratulate all yachts and crew from NCYC who participated in the 70th Sydney to Hobart. Of course a special note should be made of *She's the Culprit* on winning the inaugural Corinthian Cup ahead of 39 other participants. We are also very proud of the achievement of Sibby Ilzhofer and the crew of *Dare Devil* in winning the trophy for the first female skipper to finish this year. The Rear Commodore hosted a lovely welcome home drinks for all crews which was a great success and hopefully becomes part of our annual calendar. On a personal note, this was my first Hobart race and I now have new found respect for those skippers and crews who participate!

The first weekend in February saw the inaugural NGFC game fishing competition out of Newcastle. The event saw our marina and club facilities enjoyed by competitors and a great atmosphere was evident throughout the weekend.

NCYC's Sailing Academy has been busy hosting school sailing activities, school holiday sailing courses, member sailing courses and our inaugural regattas over the past three months. I was delighted to see members supporting our "Force 24 Harbour Dash Regatta" that was held just prior to Christmas and congratulate Joe de Kock and his all-female crew on winning the finals series of the event - Well done! The Academy will be busy throughout 2015 with a variety of courses so please make use of this unique opportunity in Newcastle and let your non-sailing colleagues know that they can now learn to sail on Newcastle Harbour.

Your Club was busy over the festive period and trading was pleasing having regard to the continued tougher economic climate. The marina enjoyed almost full occupancy over the holiday period and the Commercial Centre is now fully tenanted going into 2015.

Management have been busy on a number of projects including the installation of the long awaited fixed marks (from a sailors perspective) in the Harbour and in the Stockton Bight. These fixed marks will provide greater flexibility in respect to our sailing activities and assist in the conduct of NCYC's dinghy and Force 24 activities. NCYC is proceeding with an upgrade of its marina fuelling facilities with the installation of an all

hours credit card system at the bowser and a high flow diesel pump which will provide greater convenience for motor vessels. The Laser hardstand was opened just prior to the Christmas break, providing our dinghy sailors with secure storage adjacent to the launching facilities on A Arm. This project has been well received by NCYC's Laser fleet which is now getting 15 to 20 boats out on the water most Friday evenings.

On behalf of the Board, I would like to thank and acknowledge our Series and Sailing Academy sponsors for their ongoing assistance this season.

## Rear Commodore's Report



On the evening of 22 January the club held a well-attended function at the NCYC primarily to celebrate the success of *She's the Culprit* being the first NCYC boat to bring to the club a trophy from the Rolex Sydney to Hobart Yacht Race. This year's Hobart for the first time included a Corinthian division. A

Corinthian plays sport purely for the love it. This trophy was won by *She's the Culprit*. *She's the Culprit* also won the PHS division of the 2014 race. The function was also to congratulate the crews of *Anger Management*, *Dare Devil*, *Frantic*, *Inner Circle* and *Let's Go* on their successful completion of this great race. All the above boats have connections with our club and it is pleasing that as a small new club, we are again definitely punching above our weight.

The evening was enhanced by the attendance of Roger Hickman, the skipper and owner of *Wild Rose*. Roger is a member of our club. "Hicko" as known in sailing circles regaled and entertained all in attendance with his responses to a question and answer session. Hopefully we can make a RSHYR function a regular event.

Wild Rose is in my view the real winner of the Sydney to Hobart Yacht Race being the Tattersall's Cup winner. This trophy is for the overall handicap winner. With all the razzamatazz that is normally associated with the event with the maxi yachts, it is easy to forget the true history and character of the race. In my view, the win by Wild Rose and the addition of the Corinthian division won by She's the Culprit in its 70th year, restores tradition and integrity to the race. Hopefully the participation of boats such as Wild Rose and our boats will slowly bring back this race, its connection with the regular club racing boats and prevent its overdevelopment into a commercial spectacular.

Our club sailing season at the time of writing is well advanced with the Twilight Series being led by *Long Time Dead* (M Fenson) followed by *Nutcracker* (P Bertholli). It is good to see some eight boats racing in our twilight division. Also with our fixed marks we are able to race on more interesting courses than were previously available.

The Summer Short Ocean pointscore IRC division is currently being led by *Schouten Passage* (J Howard) 4 points ahead of *Anger Management* (P Arnall). The Short Ocean Point Score Division 1 is being led by *Long Time Dead* (M Fenson) ahead of *Aurora* (M Holley). PH Division 2 being led by *Nutcracker* (P Bertholli) ahead of *Scots Wha Hae* (V Johnston). The Short Ocean Pointscore Division 1 PHS is being led by *Summersalt* (T Gleeson) ahead of *Anger Management* 

(P Arnall) with the Division 2 of the Short Ocean Pointscore being led by *Nutcracker* (P Bertholli) ahead of perennial *Warrrain* (R Hillery).

The Ocean Pointscore IRC is being led by *Anger Manager* (P Arnall) ahead of *Summersalt* (T Gleeson).

In our longer offshore series of races known as the Cross, Lion, Bird and Cabbage, the leader of the IRC division is *Schouten Passage* (R Howard) followed by *Anger Management* (P Arnall).

The PHS Division of this series is being led by *Summer Salt* (T Gleeson) followed by *Schouten Passage* (R Howard).

At the other end of the spectrum we have lasers with the OTB division led by *Ruthless* (M Babbage) followed by *Ohio* (P Beath) with the lasers PHS division being led by *Stormy Weather* (J De Kock) ahead of *Ohio* (P Beath).

The Friendship Cup which is a competition run over a few races between our club and the Lake Macquarie Yacht Club was won this year by us with our first three boats being: *Nutcracker* (P Bertholli), *Summersalt* (T Gleeson) and *Schouten Passage* (J Howard).

All is looking good at this stage for a very successful 2014-2015 series.

## Dare Devils Day Sydney To Hobart

I was unsure what was going to be more difficult, having a yacht turn up on a truck in April and repairing her for Hobart, never having seen or sailed her before, or getting a brand new crew together, or both. Time would tell. One thing was for sure, I was going to need a strategy and a plan and very little deviation.

Yacht maintenance and reliability was going to be the most important thing, I knew that from the start, and no matter how hard people pushed me to go out and sail, enter races etc, she needed going over and everything was going to need to be double checked and triple checked. The boat was going to be the biggest hurdle.

I had some great supporters and believers cheering me on in the background, approving of my strategy along the way, even though some of the early team members may not have agreed.

Half the crew was finalised by the time we tackled the 24 hour qualifier; the object was to get to know the boat, her limitations and capabilities, and believe it or not, to break things. And that we did, but, given we tackled 24 hours of 37 knots and above, squalls, no visibility and unknown crew, we felt we already had the Hobart behind us. One thing was for sure, the boat was tough, and capable of much more.

As always, there are heads to butt, opinions, last minute repairs and crew to substitute at a moment's notice. Nothing was different here. I felt additional pressure; as all eyes were on the female skippers and female crew this Hobart. No one is a born superstar and I was no different. Some of the interviews were more nerve racking than doing a solo delivery, battling with taking sails down in the middle of the night at 25 knot breeze in a busy Sydney Harbour.



When we eventually pulled it together, international crew and new boat, hoping we had ironed out all the unknowns. We ended up on the start line on time, with plenty of sailing practice under our belt. Surprisingly so, nerves were no longer an issue, I think the hardest part was behind us.

We ended up with a 'cracker' of a start, only to get squeezed out by nearly T-boning the start boat, right of way or not. Were we really going to argue with a bigger boat? So, a quick 360 jibe was in order, which we managed gracefully and almost silently, still managing to round the outer marker not long after the maxis, to make the Chanel 7 news. Bonus!

In sailing, there are always disagreements about what to do, and what could have been done better. That's life. The important thing was to keep the team functioning, have the finish line in mind and not break the boat.

'To finish first, first you must finish'. Number one rule in ocean racing. This was no different. The key was to read the boat, read the weather and prevent, even if that meant putting my foot down sometimes with crew, that often wanted bigger and faster. Sea miles out there give you a knowing, that you cannot get from books.

We got slammed a couple of times. Storm Bay is what it is, every time. The incident with the plane is an all too real reminder of that. Whilst some vessels broke their boom and mainsails, we managed to hold it together, despite of puncture wounds to the main.

As with everything, experiences are there to learn from and this venture and race was no different. The timing, new boat and new crew may have presented a challenge, without a doubt, but focus, dedication and commitment goes a long way towards achieving the dream.

Never lose sight of the dream.

What's next? More sailing of course!



With the recent acquisition of the Force 24 keelboat fleet Newcastle and Lake Macquarie now offer a wider range of complimentary sailing courses to cater for both racing and cruising.

Since the very successful Discover Sailing Day in October, NCYC has commenced running some short sailing experience courses in the lead up to Christmas with plans to offer a fully accredited Yachting Australia Keelboat Program in the near future.

The courses, Start Crewing, Start Helming and Start Skippering, are designed to take the participant from basic sailing through to safely skippering a keelboat in protected waters. Participants will learn how each person's role on the boat will lead to being a part of an effective crew. The skills and knowledge learned through these courses are readily transferable to yacht racing.

Lake Macquarie's Chris Griffiths of Master Class offers a wide range of RYA and YA accredited sail training courses for yachts. The courses range from basic sailing to Yachtmaster. Many of his courses are designed to cater for cruising. They include Coastal Navigation, Marine Radio and Day Skipper. He has also held a Sea Safety Survival Course.

Capacity on the marina over summer was stretched to its limits numerous times with many visiting vessels from Australia Day weekend followed by the Newcastle Game Fishing Clubs inaugural fishing tournament. We hosted 70 NGFC vessels on the 7th Feb, greeted yachts from the CYCA Sydney /Newcastle race on 21st Feb as well as Croudace Bay Sailing Club fleet on 28th Feb.

With a very busy flow of boats through the marina, it is crucial that we keep all walkways clear as well as maintain easy access to marina cleats so all bikes, hoses, boxes, dinghies, kayaks etc must be kept on your boat at all times. I've noticed a number of boats are not securely tied up and not using appropriate lines. Many boats are using sailing lines which have no give thus putting stress on the boat & marina cleats—it is better to use a rope that has some elasticity as a mooring line as there is less stress on your boat and the jetty. You can contact the marina chandler if you need assistance with purchasing line.

Besides the implementation of our new software package which has been of great assistance over the busy period, I am pleased to advise that we will be installing a new marina key card system using a proximity card (your membership card) in a wireless real time system which will have an online updating hotspot and stand-alone electronic locks. The new system will be fully sealed to handle the harsh salt environment and will be a vast improvement on our current card system incorporating the latest in technology. Installation will take place in conjunction with the Club's new financial year.

The marina barrows will be given a birthday with pneumatic tyres being installed plus we are adding four more barrows to cater for the extra needs of the marina business.

Another enhancement for the marina will be the installation of new fuel bowsers incorporating fast & slow flow pumps on the diesel and regular flow on the PULP as detailed in our Commodore's report. We have also engaged Pacific Pontoon & Pier to install a new pontoon in berth A 25/26 thus allowing us to use the berth again to handle the extra needs of the marina.

There may be some short term inconvenience with the installation of some of these enhancements. Please be considerate that they are all for the long term improvement of our facility.



## The Mission to Seafarers

Happy New Year to all members.

The year just finished had its quota of tragic events, including the Maritime Industry, as we received news of two separate tragic deaths of seafarers off the coast of Australia in the last three months of 2014. In both instances we liaised with the various relevant Authorities to provide much needed practical and pastoral support for each of the crews involved. These incidents remind us that the life of the seafarer is not an easy one.

On a brighter note, due to the generosity of the people of Newcastle and the Hunter, we were able to deliver three hundred individual gift packs to all seafarers visiting our Port in the few days leading up to Christmas. On Christmas Day our team provided special meals, guided tours of the city and spread good cheer for those seafarers lucky enough to be able to come ashore. Regardless of culture or faith, they all like to celebrate that special day.

During our on-board ship visits we occasionally meet up with a Ship's Master or Officer who has a few minutes to chat. At times they become reflective of their life as a seafarer. As well as the difficulties of life at sea they share feelings of the difficulties of going home after their contract of at least ten months has finished.

They have to re-adjust to their family lifestyle, so different from their work life at sea – getting to know their children again or, for some, seeing them for the first time. Then there is the re-learning to live with their wives again, both having lived virtual separate lives for most of the year. Just as they all begin to re-adjust, it's time to sign up for another contract and so the cycle begins again. Those who can't manage this continual emotional roller-coaster can fall into depression, a scourge of all seafarers.

During a recent Apostleship of the Sea National Conference, an Indian seafarer shared with us many stories of hardship of a life at sea and how vital it was for him to be able to come ashore to a place where he could feel safe, where there was no bullying or racial or cultural discrimination, a place where he could communicate with his family, a place that felt like a home away from home. This is the very place we try to provide, through the love and generosity of our team of volunteers and the support of many people and businesses of Newcastle.

Occasionally we witness a "feel good" story in our ministry that brightens our day. Just after Christmas we were visited by two Korean brothers who had driven up from Sydney that morning to meet up with their Chief Engineer brother who had just arrived in a vessel berthed at Kooragang. The two brothers had not seen their seafarer brother for fifteen years for one and twenty three years for the other. We were able to transport the very excited Chief Engineer to our Mission Centre, where there was a very joyful, and even tearful reunion – all part of the service!



We hope you were able to participate in the LUNAR (Light up Newcastle and Rotary) event. This was a major undertaking by the Rotary Clubs of Newcastle, celebrating Chinese New Year held on 21st February and raising funds for a replacement bus to assist us in transporting seafarers from the various berths to our Mission Centre, Marketown and return.

There has been a lot of hard work gone into organising this event, including the co-operation of your Club, and we at the Mission are appreciative of being the financial beneficiaries.

We have already spent some time in planning on ways to improve how we can provide that home-away-from-home for the visiting seafarers.

The Chaplains and Volunteers of the Mission to Seafarers wish members and staff safe sailing and an enjoyable 2015.


