The Sydney to Hobart proved to be one of the tougher races in recent

times, the TV coverage lived up to its reputation in telling us nothing about the boats other than the Maxi's. 



in time to sit for the Intermediate Certificate at "the highest school in Newcastle". Not to be deterred, with parental agreement this time, he left home to join the Navy and had two tours of duty in Vietnam.

Ernie had a widely varied career. Apart from his years in the RAN, he has owned and managed both retail and agricultural businesses successfully. Within the Cashmere industry he was a qualified Fine Fibre Classer/ Judge and TAFE Fine Fibre Lecturer. He has years of experience as a Coal Miner and Miners Federation Representative.

Ernie's sports have been as varied as his working career. He was a short term member of the Rough Riders Association and enjoyed competing in cattle drafting events while still a member of Newcastle Neptunes Spearfishing Club. 





Marina Development - Howard Keegan

Marina Development is a new & challenging role in NCYC created to build a stronger marina business. I have accepted the challenge of the role as I believe that there is much we can do to attract more boats over the short & long term to our facility.

Newcastle does not have the playground like Lake Macquarie or Pittwater to naturally attract boats so we need to provide the right incentives to attract long term vessels to stay at our unique facility. Long term occupants need a reason to keep their boats here besides the fact that the owner may live nearby. Hence we have a racing fleet & currently forming a cruising fleet. The aim here is to build an active boating club membership on the marina.

Short term occupancy is a different ball game, our facility is known by many as one of the most welcoming & hospitable marinas on the east coast. BUT there are still many more owners out there who do not know about us as we still get many arrivals who hop off their boat and say "I did not know this was here" OR "how long has this marina been here?" There are two strands in this market, the individual vessels who cruise our coastline and the cruising clubs & fleets who do the weekend rallies. Some of them already visit us but there are a larger proportion who have not sampled the NCYC hospitality as yet. My role is to attract these vessels & fleets to our facility.

I will also be involved in the formation of NCYC Cruising. This group of boat owners are looking for the gentler & more social aspect of boating other than racing plus it will include motorboats. I am also researching the possibility of forming a remote control

model yacht fleet which will be known as NCYC RC—stay tuned for more on this soon. If anybody is interested in either the cruising or model yachts and would like more details, please contact me.

The recent Down Under Rally from Noumea was most successful. Included in the fleet were some members of the Ocean Cruising Club (OCC) who were so impressed with our facility and the role I played in the event they initiated an application to invite me to be the Port Officer Repesentative for Newcastle to the OCC. I have accepted the voluntary role which fits perfectly within my new role of Marina Development because it gives NCYC access to the world cruising market.

WHAT IS THE OCEAN CRUISING CLUB? It is a UK based International Club for blue water cruisers. With membership of over 2300 people it has no premises as such but regards the oceans of the world as its clubhouse. To qualify as a member you must have completed an ocean passage of no less than 1000 nautical miles on the rhumbline in a vessel no longer than 70' LOA, hence it is based on what you have done, not who you are! Members are people with a potent combination of qualities such as accomplishment, experience, idealism, eccentricity, generosity & humility. The distinctive blue & yellow burgee is a welcome and respected sight in any anchorage.

To compliment, aid & assist their members on the water, the OCC has near 200 Port Officer members representing various destinations around the world. This is an invited role where the Port Officer is the contact to the OCC vessels giving them information on their area of reference as well as any assistance in port entry, customs & AQIS requirements as well as organise events from dinners up to rallies similar to the Down Under Rally. This is a new & untapped market for NCYC which is promoted via the OCC website as the port officer maintains their own information page fortheir respective destination. I look forward with great anticipation to the challenges of this new role within NCYC.

Remote Control Yachts

Newcastle Cruising Yacht Club is considering forming a fleet of remote control yachts to race on weekends & subject to demand may have a midweek twilight. There are about 20 clubs registered with the NSW Radio Yachting Association who race regularly with interclub regattas, state & national titles held annually.

There are a number of racing classes of yachts plus a lot of recreational classes so plenty of options to choose from. Obviously there is a huge price range starting at about \$250 for a small recreational class going up to the

larger racing classes topping at prices near \$5000. Generally the dollars reflect the quality as well.

The two most popular classes are the International One Metre (IOM) class and the 10R class which start at about \$700 for a reasonable 2nd hand boat. A number of top name yacht designers have been involved with designing some boats within the rules of each class making for very keen competition at the top level.

Most clubs cater for the range of classes and levels of racing by running persuit races and have point score races for the classes if they have enough boats to make a fleet of a class. NCYC would follow this trend with our main aim of allowing a low cost entry in buying a boat and maintaining a fun, friendly & social atmosphere within our group of owners. If you wish to be competitive then it is your option.

I have been liaising with the nearest club being Lake Macquarie Radio Yacht Club who have offered to visit our Club with the IOM & 10R classes and do an exhibition day for us. The boats are quite easy to sail, so after some short instruction you can test your skills on the day. I will organise the exhibition day and promote it through our usual channels so stay tuned.

Boat Profile - NCYC Vessels

Newcastle Cruising Yacht Club owns a number of boats for different uses & purposes within the club. Following are NCYC boats along with their purpose.

"Wombat" is a Steber 36 motorboat, the perfect setup to be the club committee & start boat for racing offshore as well as some inshore use. Wombat has recently undergone a refit with Midcoast Boatyard & Marine to update some equipment & cleanup some of the old features to ensure she will be serviceable to the Club for many years to come.



"George Keegan" named after our founding & life member (now deceased), this boat is a 9.5m Protector RIB with twin 115hp Yamaha outboards. Since purchase it has benefitted from new Hypalon tubing & the engines have also been replaced. It is used as a mark laying vessel and due to its high speed potential in offshore conditions, it's ideal for rescues and rapid course changes. A sister ship was used to bring an injured crew member from "Wild Oats" off Newcastle – the integral inflatable tubing allowed that Protector to directly alongside "Wild Oats" as she kept racing & safely transferred the injured crew member ashore for medical treatment. "George Keegan" was the rescue boat first on scene to rescue the crew of "Woodstock" when it sank.



"Paul Gleeson" (also named after a hard working & popular member now deceased) is a 5.5m RIB used as rescue & committee boat for NCYC Laser racing. It is also the tender & safety boat for our fleet of F24 sailing boats. With a single 100hp outboard this boat is very quick and ideal for inshore rescue vessel duties.



Aluminium 3m punt (currently unnamed) was purchased as a work boat (with the 15hp outboard donated by Ernie Thirkell). This boat is used for marina maintenance & other small jobs around the marina. It has also been considered as the safety & mark boat for the proposed NCYC Radio Control fleet. This boat needs to be named so any suggestions would be welcome. Force 24 Keelboats. NCYC own six of these MB&D designed keelboats which were purchased from RPAYC along with spare sets of racing sails. The F24's are a perfect sail training vessel for students of all ages including school children through to adults. They can also be used for corporate sailing and match racing events.

The F24's are very active and the club intends to conduct

Optimist Dinghy's. A fleet of 12 "Opti's" is on its way to NCYC in March. These boats will be used for the Yachting Australia "Tackers" program which is designed as the initial step for school aged children in their sailing pathway. The "Opti's" will also be highly active and create a visual spectacle on the arbour.

On the 25th October, Max caught a Yellowfin Tuna weighing 48.1 kg caught over "The Shelf" East of Newcastle.



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The Mission to Seafarers

Happy New Year to all members. It seems we have just celebrated Christmas and New Year and now it's almost Easter already!

In December our volunteers spent much time sorting a host of personal toiletries, gifts, beanies and plum puddings into individual bags for delivery to all seafarers in our Port during the week leading up to Christmas, and on Christmas and Boxing Days. In all we were able to distribute four hundred and twenty individual gift packs which was a tribute to the generosity of people in Newcastle and the Hunter and to our volunteers who put the packs together. It's always wonderful to experience the joy on the faces of the seafarers when gifts are delivered on board. The giving of gifts, particularly at Christmas, to those who are away from home, families and friends is a joyful time for us.

In addition to the gifts, our Mission Centre was open all over the holiday period, providing food and refreshments to some seafarers who were able to come ashore. With assistance from the vessel's shipping agent we were able to arrange a Catholic Mass service on board the Kinko Maru for a Filipino crew on Boxing Day. Their joy and appreciation at being able to celebrate their faith in this way was expressed several times by the Master and his crew.

On the subject of church services we have commenced regular 5.30pm Thursday afternoon services with Fr. Andrew Doohan from the Catholic Cathedral presiding. Volunteers, local parishioners and visiting Filipino seafarers have formed a small community. This is a rare opportunity for seafarers to celebrate their faith in this way and for locals to mix with our overseas visitors.

Another joyful part of our ministry is to help arrange family reunions. Recently we were able to connect a Filipino chief engineer with his sister, and later a young seafarer from Myanmar with his sister and other family members who had travelled up from Sydney.



The holiday period often provides challenges for visiting crews. We received a call early on New Year's Day from a Ukranian Master who needed to change his US currency urgently to purchase much needed provisions. He couldn't wait until the following week for the banks to open as their departure from Newcastle was booked for that afternoon. The Master, and his crew, was very appreciative as they had a long journey ahead of them.



The January wet and windy weather caused havoc with traffic in and out of the harbour. While this may have caused disruptions to scheduling and its associated financial cost, there was an upside. The closure of the port on one particular day provided a Filipino crew the opportunity to come ashore at the time they were originally scheduled to depart. They were so excited, laughing, joking and singing during the bus trip to our Mission Centre, just like a class of school children on the last afternoon before the Christmas holidays. Their officer explained that they had been at sea a long time and it was so good to be able to come ashore, change their money and visit Marketown for shopping and to connect with people of Newcastle.

A recent ship visit gave us an opportunity to share some time with a Chinese Master in his cabin. It was a sad conversation as he shared with us how lonely is the life of a seafarer, especially the vessel's Master. This is particularly so when there is a combination of different races and cultures on board.

the Master has no-one he can comfortably connect with to help share his loneliness. These occasions remind us of why we do what we do.

The chaplains and volunteers at the Mission to Seafarers wish all members a happy and safe 2016.

Sydney to Hobart 2015 The Little Blue Boats Tale

ny Sydney Hobart Race starts way before the starter's gun at 1pm on the 26th of December. Ensuring that the boat is ready for anything that Mother Nature can throw at you is a monumental task on even a small boat like The Culprit. Fortunately, The Culprit team, led from the front by Cyril (who really does most of the work) managed to get the yacht to Sydney, ready & raring to go well before Christmas Day, so that come Boxing Day, we were as ready as any team could be. Start day found us all excited, about the prospect of a good breeze to start in & a great breeze to get us scooting down the coast, hopefully as far as possible, before the expected Southerly Buster. The pre-race circus at the CYCA, followed by the milling around prior to race time, is surely one of the greatest events to be a part of. From the multi-million dollar maxi's to the 30 & 40 footers, it is a sight to behold. The adrenaline builds & the excitement is overflowing. Everywhere you look, everyone has a smile like a split watermelon. Add to all this, a beautiful day & a building Nor' easter & the scene is set for a cracker start.

On the 3rd start line, way back from the television cameras & paid crews, the last 5 minutes to start is as tense as it is 500m closer to the heads. Everyone wants to get a clear air start without breaking the line & without breaking a boat. We hit the line with the breeze gusting to 30 knots with 2 reefs & a number 4 to make our way to the heads. It was like Pitt St on a Friday afternoon at knock off time, but with all the frantic tacking going on in the runway between the spectator boats. Add to this, several bigger boats that had come unstuck early & were simply running straight back through the smaller boats, with little or no care for self preservation & you have yourself a recipe for white knuckle, seat of the pants sailing.

To get out around the Inner & Outer marks was absolute relief & too then watch the spinnaker set & start scooting down the coast towards Hobart, hitting speeds of up to 15 knots, was absolutely sensational. To run like this for the next 7 or so hours was great, even if during this time we destroyed one spinnaker when the

kite pole unclipped & drove through the bottom of the sail, a second spinnaker when it tore after wrapping on the forstay, a windward brace that broke at the pole & finally the masthead halyard, that left us down to our fractional kites & making far less speed than hoped.

The Southerly hit with a bang as they always do & after some initial work to get everything settled, we settled in for what was a cold, wet & very windy (up to 45+knots) next couple of days. With up to 80% of the crew virtually disabled with seasickness & the rest of the team just keeping the boat pointing south, we were not exactly your highly functional sailing team. The 48 hours of hard southerly breezes never at any stage made us feel that either the boat or the crew (even the sick ones) were not going to get through the blow. So by the time we made it towards Eden & the sea state & seasickness began to abate, a much happier boat all round was able to head into Bass Straight.

As tough as the previous 2 days had been, the next day & a half was tough only in that we were struggling to find breeze most of the time & sometimes battling currents that at times tried to take us off between Tasmania & Flinders Island. The predicted northerlies finally came in on the morning of the fourth day, so after re-running the masthead halyard in the middle of Bass Straight the day before, we were able to set our last masthead kite & make up a lot of miles in a good 15 to 20 knot breeze that carried us all the way to Tasman Light.

But with the home stretch now in sight the breeze did a vanishing act & it took us at least the next 12 hours to sail from Tasman Light to the Iron Pot across this millpond called Storm Bay. At least all the amateur photographers got plenty of time to take some great shots of Cape Raul & Tasman Light atop Tasman Island. Fortunately around midnight on the 30th, we found ourselves on the right side of a freshening breeze from the nor'west (6-10 knots) that gave us a bee-line to the Iron Pot.

We passed the Iron Pot in pitch darkness with 2 other yachts hot on our heels at about 3am & spent the next 3 hours in a tacking duel up the Derwent in breeze that ranged from 3 knots to 25 knots. This part of the race was almost as tense as the start, with the whole crew on deck & instructions flying from the Nav to the Helm & on to the crew as if it was us that were racing for line honours.

We crossed the line in 61st position, at a little after 5.30am on the 31st of December with an elapsed time of 4 days, 16 hours, 30 minutes & 4 seconds and came in to Constitution Dock to be met by a very vocal group of family & friends that made for a very emotional finish. It is absolutely, the Everest of ocean sailing & we were so proud to have made it to the finish & to have placed 3rd on handicap in the PHS Division.

I'd like to thank the entire crew for a herculean effort in getting the boat to Hobart in one piece & in such good spirits. Cyril Picasso, Glenn Bulmer, Adrian Kiely, Bob Jarvie, Trent Butler, Dom Tanner, Kathy Hall, Kristen Anderson, Richard Hooper, Steve Robinson, Tristan Hough.

I hope you enjoyed the tale as much as we enjoyed the ride south.

South China Sea Scuba Dive



Crowds welcome Queen Elizabeth to Newcastle Passengers and crew of the Cunard vessel Queen Elizabeth received a warm welcome this morning from hundreds of onlookers who lined the Newcastle Foreshore and Stockton Foreshore.

The red and black cruise liner arrived in the Port of Newcastle at 7.15am, sailing past Nobbys Headland with 1,956 passengers and 989 crew on board.

After docking at the Channel Berth, the ship's passengers had the opportunity to explore the Hunter region and take part in the many shore excursions planned, from food and wine tours in the Hunter Valley, dolphin cruises at Port Stephens and Newcastle city highlights tours.

A civic reception was held to mark the vessel's connection to the 450 Squadron, which sailed on Cunard's original Queen Elizabeth to serve in World War II. Queen Elizabeth's captain Alistair Clark, along with veterans, their families, RAAF personal and local dignitaries attended the commemorative service. A 'keys to the city' welcome reception was also hosted in honour of the cruise ship.

Port of Newcastle's CEO, Geoff Crowe, acknowledged that Queen Elizabeth's visit was a highlight of the 2015-16 cruise season. "It was terrific to see the warm welcome that our community provided to Queen Elizabeth today, and it was a privilege for the

port to host Queen Elizabeth," said Mr Crowe.

"It is the first Cunard vessel to visit the Port of Newcastle since 1907.

"We appreciate the economic benefit that cruise ship visitors and crew bring to our region and hope that today is the first of many visits by Queen Elizabeth."

The Australian Cruise Association estimates that cruise shipping provides an injection of around \$11 million per annum to the Hunter region's economy.

Many lucky guest departing with valuable auction prizes and thank you for your enthusiastic bidding.




