#### Rear Commodore's Report



Time flys when you're having fun they say, and I find myself wondering where the time went between the last time I sat down to write this update in late November, and now....so I must be having fun....right?

We all love to get out on the water and race but there is an element of

risk associated with what we all love to do for leisure. At NCYC we take this risk seriously and we like to believe if the unthinkable happened, we would know exactly how many were on the boat or boats, who they were, and their NOK details. Don't think it can happen? Think again; it already has at NCYC due to a collision. Thankfully we only lost one boat (which was later recovered from the seabed) and no lives. The boat sank in approximately 5 mins. Skippers are responsible to ensure all crew know where life jackets are and how to use them. We also require SKIPPERS, to fill in ALL the details for ALL on board in TES for this reason.

It would be great if we didn't have any collisions, so what can you do to ensure you don't? There are two main areas that sailors racing at NCYC need to be extra vigilant – around commercial shipping plus your rights AND obligations under the Racing Rules of Sailing (RRS). As far as shipping goes, all owners sign a declaration with the sailing office that we have read and understood our obligations in a narrow shipping channel when encountering a vessel limited by its draft and manoevreability – basically you don't have any rights and that is why your engine must be running (in neutral) in the harbour and 500m to seaward out and in. That leaves the RRS.....I can hear the sighs from here, but the new rules have been in force since January 1. While we strongly encourage a detailed knowledge, it's inevitable that there will be a wide spectrum of understanding. As a skipper and a crew you MUST at a minimum understand the Definitions (particularly with respect to "keeping clear" and "proper course"), Rules 10 through 20 (most of the Right of Way stuff), and the last 3 pages that explain all the flags. If it's all new to you, there is a book called "The Rules in Practice 2017-2020" that Bryan Willis writes every three years; and it has lots of pictures! racing-rules/ and the NCYC SI are here http://www.ncyc.net. au/wpcontent/ uploads/2012/11/ Combined-Copy-to-Upload.pdf So what else has been happening at NCYC sailing? The Sailing Academy has been very busy during summer with both kids and adults enjoying the school

holiday break down at NCYC. We hosted nearly 30 children for a variety of weeklong activities in our Tackers dinghies and the Force 24s. During this time we also conducted 4-day Women's Sailing and Start Crewing courses and a very popular Discover Sailing Experience - our biggest one day enrolment yet! We also had a visit from Australian Sailing staff to assess our course delivery and I must stay a huge thank you to our instructors who do such a fantastic job, as we received great praise from the Club Services Officer.

Now into school term time we are again running Wednesday afternoon and Saturday morning Tackers. Our keelboat courses are continuing to build in numbers and we will host three Scout groups in the next few weeks with more children having the opportunity to experience our wonderful sport. None of this happens without the dedication and constant effort of our Sailing team Jacqui Ellis and Jack Buchan.

Jacqui, Jack and I would very much like to thank members, Jan & Rob Howard who are providing an extremely valuable link between our Sailing Academy and our club racing by offering "Schouten Passage" as Wednesday Twilight "Sail Training" for academy graduates. This is a very generous offer and most appreciated by the Club. As a final note on our womens' sailing, look out for the "She Sails" fleet racing in our Force 24s coming up on 18th March.

The Lasers finished up the Spring series since my last update which saw Joe de Kock, Michael Babbage and Paul Beath take the top three results in Off The Beach racing. The Handicap hours went to Michael while the other podium positions were filled by Dean Nissen and Ben Rigby.

The Pittwater to Southport Race saw fast and wet conditions for all the entrants with Phil Arnall's "Anger Management" fininishing in just under 40 hours and taking 2nd for Line Honours just behind our friends from LMYC, on Doug Coulter's Rogers 46, "Shakti".

The COP series will conclude with two races to and from Pittwater on 4th and 5th March. "Anger Management" is leading the series but nothing is a certainty in yacht racing and crews on all the boats in the hunt will be sailing hard to grab what they can.

Enjoy what remains of the Summer and remember that Sail Port Stephens celebrates it's 10th year the 3rd to the 9th of April with our race to Port Stephens on the 2nd. It promises to be a great regatta.

## Chief Executive Officer's Report



Dear Members
Welcome to the Autumn
editions of NCYC's journal. It
has been a long, hot Summer!
As many of you may have
already heard, I have resigned
as Chief Executive Officer
with NCYC. I have provided

NCYC an extended notice period in order to assist with recruitment of a Marina and Assets Manager plus the soon to be vacant CEO position. I am departing NCYC after a busy and productive tenure and have reflected briefly on the achievements over this time.

Sailing at NCYC has grown to include a fleet of twelve Optimist Dinghy's conducting the Sailing Australia Tackers Program which required two new safety boats, work to reconfigure the F-Arm marina, boat storage and a new pontoon. Another new and popular activity has been the Twilight Development Series on the Force 24's and most recently, She Sails Regatta. The Farr 40's enjoyed a spectacular one-design regatta in January and there is already talk of their return to NCYC in 2018. Jaqueline Ellis and Jack Buchan were recruited to the Sailing Academy and NCUC Club sailing respectively and they have proven themselves from their first days. The relationships that NCYC has with stakeholders within the port have developed favourably after continued efforts which align with NCYC's Aquatic Licence.

The marina has a new high profile tenant – Rolex Sydney Hobart Yacht Race 2016, Line Honours winner "Perpetual Loyal"! "Scallywag" also spent time at NCYC before heading departing for an extensive international regatta and passage race program. Pleasingly, both



supermaxi's engaged local trades to undertake repair and maintenance work soon after their arrivals. The new fuel bowser system was brought online and several teething problems rectified ahead of an upgrade to the fendering in the fuel berths plus also security and emergency response hardware upgrades. Importantly, NCYC has been subscribed to the Marina Industries Association Clean Marinas program which will assist NCYC in managing its environmental responsibilities.

The Commercial Centre has experienced tenant changes which should deliver improved street appeal and renewed enthusiasm within the precinct. There has also been a significant change to the NCYC lease which allows for a more durable composition of tenants for NCYC.

The challenges within the clubhouse have been ongoing however steps are underway to reduce management involvement of the restaurant and focused attention on the bar and functions business. Options to improve the NCYC carpark have been reviewed and a recommendation is currently before the NCYC Board. I would like to thank the Board of Directors for the opportunity with NCYC and to thank members for their support and encouragement also.



#### MEMBER PROFILE Philip Unicomb

Since joining NCYC approximately three years ago, Phil Unicomb's regular patronage and outgoing friendly personality have ensured his becoming a well-known and respected member of the Club.

Phil could be described as being a local, having been born in Maitland and educated back and forward in the triangle of Maitland, Port Stephens and Newcastle.

People are surprised to find out that Phil originally trained at Royal Newcastle Hospital as a student nurse in order to get the money to learn to fly. He hated it but even so, eventually qualified as an RN, simultaneously training for and gaining his Commercial Pilot License.

Phil's interest was competition aerobatics at which he had astounding success, winning about 14 Australian Championships during the period 1984 to 1998. The list is so extensive and impressive that they have been attached to the end of this article. Phil commented that the apex of these achievements was winning the 1992 World Tiger Moth Aerobatic Championship in Bedfordshire, UK.

Phil's aeronautical achievements haven't been restricted to his flying ability. He has been heavily involved with Royal Newcastle Aero Club (RNAC) since 1978. He was RNAC Club Captain from 1984 – 1986 inclusive and served two separate terms on the RNAC Board of Directors from 1984 to 1987 and again from 1998 to 2003. He was the Corporate Pilot for Weldon International from 1988 -1993 operating a DHC-2 Beaver Amphibian (600 hours) and a PA31-350 Piper Chieftain – single pilot IFR (1052 hours) as well as vintage aircraft in the fleet including DH82 and SA4B Stampe.

Phil's has been instructing since 1993, beginning as a volunteer at RNAC. From 1994 to 1995 he worked as an Instructor and Charter Pilot for Professional Pilot Training at Cessnock, and then rejoined RNAC in 1995. All this before he and a business partner/close friend Squadron Leader Dave Freedman went on to form "Action Aerobatics" in 2000.

Their core business was two pronged: an advanced flight training school and; air displays. The air displays were national and international, mainly through SE Asia and Eastern Australia. During this period Phil produced approximately 30 State and National Champion pilots in various Aerobatic Categories including unlimited level.

Five and a half years ago, in June 2011, Phil's "world came crashing down" or at least he did! He was flying a "Pitts Special" biplane in an air show in country NSW and to quote him: "I had my prang – like a BANG". Phil had six months off work due to



the resultant fractured spine, but it seems nothing will keep him down (Pun intended). Whilst recovering he was approached by the Royal Newcastle Aeroclub at Rutherford and offered the position of Chief Pilot/Chief Flying Instructor. He has been there ever since. Phil's current title is Senior Pilot Examiner.



All the other kids at Manly do a mid-week training session which both Harry and Luca cannot attend, so it makes their effort even more remarkable.







#### Farr 40 Newcastle One Design Trophy - 21 & 22 Jan

Saturday morning of the two day regatta began in the dark at 5.30am for Club Staff with the launching of race committee vessels, marks being inflated and flags being flown. In the Clubhouse, we had the kitchen in full swing priming for breakfast while the Club and Marquee were



also being prepared for some 200 people who included sailors, officials and NCYC volunteers.

Principle Race Officer (PRO), Ted Anderson, arrived on scene to view the latest weather readings reporting 15 knot Southerly winds with an uncomfortable 3m Southerly swell. With consistent wind, the fleet vacated the safety of the Harbour and sailed into Stockton Bight where they experienced the idyllic offshore race track that we have to offer off Newcastle. Boat of the Day, "Estate Master", and six other Farr 40s could be seen launching off waves upwind and surfing waves downwind for the duration of the four windward/ leeward races held that day.

The boat "Exile" had mixed fortunes when a crew member hurt themselves in the heavy swell and spent the rest of the day lying at the back of the boat — groaning as they leaped off every wave! He stayed there for the remainder of the day, allowing the team to steal a win in race three, until the end of the day where it was



discovered that he had broken 3 ribs in the fall that morning! "Estate Master" took home the "Event Leader" flags with three out of four wins



on day one.
Sunday started
much the same
for some,

before sunrise.
Competitors
on the other

hand, were treated with a relaxed start to the day with racing postponed for several hours while waiting for the wind to kick in.

With almost 5knts from the South-East, the PRO advised





the fleet that we would be sailing on the picturesque race course to the South of Nobby's. With a start just off Nobby's Beach, we got a one lap race away in light, diminishing winds. Shortly after the last boat finished, the wind dropped completely and left us awaiting a North-Easterly change.

In hopes of a North-Easterly change coming in, we moved the start line to Bar Beach and waited as several competitors took an opportunity to cool off in the lucid blue waters while skippers took the opportunity to share their "vote" as to whether or not it was worth waiting in no wind for another race. The PRO acknowledged the popularity votes which remained split 50/50 as to stay or to go.

Hours after the completion of the first race, there were significant signs of a building breeze. The fast efforts of volunteers saw a course laid and a start away in under 15 minutes with a growing crowd of spectators congregating on the ANZAC Memorial Bridge.

Martin Hill's "Estate Master" secured their scorecard with their fifth win out of the total six race regatta, which saw them return to the marina flying both the "Boat of the Day" and the "Event Leader" flags before taking refuge in the Marquee for presentation and prize giving.



#### Sail Port Stephens 2017

This event was well attended in 2016 and NCYC made a significant contribution. This year promises to be bigger and better given the 10 year Anniversary celebrations.

Our Club had five entrants in the NCYC Lead in Race last year with thirty one visiting yachts providing strong competition. 

It has been an extremely busy few months for the NCYC Sailing Academy with significant growth in participant numbers as well as a number of firsts being achieved!

Our very first Tackers junior dinghy learn-to-sail courses went very well during term 4 of the 2016 school year with both the Wednesday afternoon and Saturday morning programs filled to capacity. We rolled straight into two week-long school holiday programs which saw numerous kids join us for some January sailing fun! We are now part way through our term 1 programs,



again with great participation numbers. Our newly trained dinghy instructors and assistant instructors have been doing a fabulous job, all very willing to learn and improve their skills under the guidance of our Tackers Leader, Nina Long. During an Australian Sailing course delivery review

conducted in January we received very positive feedback and high praise for our Tackers program. This is a direct result of the wonderful efforts of our instructing team and I thank them most sincerely for their efforts and enthusiasm for this great junior program.

We have loads of junior activities happening on our Force 24s too . . . including our school holiday Sail & Play camps catering for our "Tween" sailors. During school term we host weekly school sailing activities three days a week and this term we are hosting four local scout groups . . . our largest being Kotara Scouts where we had 45 kids hit the water in our full fleets of Force 24s and Tackers dinghies!

During the summer we also introduced our first Corporate Sailing activities on our Force 24s which proved very popular during December for end-of-year activities and Christmas parties. We worked closely with the Club functions team to ensure our guests were well catered for both on and off the water. We are aiming to work on strategies to encourage participants to continue on the pathway to Start Helming and Start Skippering courses. We increased the number of Saturday morning 3-hour Force 24 Discover Sailing Experiences on offer which provide an easy and inexpensive "taste" of sailing.

This initiative has proven helpful to wet the appetite of beginners for more of our sail training activities.

Women's Sailing on Fridays is going from strength to strength . . . . particularly under the enthusiastic guidance of volunteer instructors Jan Howard and Mary Holley. With assistance from our regular Friday instructors, Nina Long, Emma Gearing and Craig Lembke we have increased our numbers significantly over the summer. Not only do the women learn sailing skills, gain experience and meet new friends, they have fun along the way . . . and with the generous support from Robert Oatley Vineyards, all enjoy our Bubbles & Nibbles presentations at the end of the four-week program.

With all of this increase in activity in the Sailing Academy we are now working towards creating pathways into our regular Club sailing activities. The Autumn/Winter months will still be very busy with a number of instructor courses planned and we are also looking to provide Powerboat Handling courses to our race volunteers and members. Not to mention our Youth Performance Program will be up and running again offering inshore keelboat racing opportunities, in both fleet and match, against our friends from the major Sydney Clubs.
