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

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Rear Commodore's Report



Well, here we go into another year and it seems there's a light at the end of the tunnel; I just hope it's not a train coming the other way. It's been a year, a December and a January like no other we have had in living memory – limited travel, limited contact with loved ones, no Hobart, limited

sailing, and state border barriers going up and down like yoyos. All the approved vaccines will be able to stop us getting unwell BUT that does not mean we will not pass the disease on to others if we are exposed. The big question that still remains unanswered so far is whether the vaccine will provide sterilising immunity. This type of immunity prevents us passing it on. Because of that, we must keep doing what we are doing regardless of your vaccination status until that question is answered. Keep in mind that there are currently four vaccines (Pfizer/BioNTech, University of Oxford/AstraZeneca, Novavax, and COVAX Facility) contracted for use in Australia and results/immunity status may differ between them. Why is this in my news bulletin? Because we need you all to understand the importance of the measures we are taking during sailing and the seriousness with which we view non-compliance.

Vaccinations – If you're under the age of 50 and generally well, there are 13 million people (26 million doses) ahead of you in the line to receive it, so this is going to take a while. Please hang in there with us and take the preventative measures seriously even after you are vaccinated.

So, what about sailing? The Bay Sailing Centre Learn to Sail jumped off to a big start with 30 participants in the last week of last year. During this Christmas and January school holidays there were periods where our staff at the BSC coffee machine couldn't keep up... On January 17th, the Lasers had 3 'casual' races at the BSC, and the fleet has now grown to 15. Sixteen women from the She Sails team also paid the centre a visit just before Australia Day for some racing on the Puffin Pacers. Of course, being well organised meant that this included champagne, chicken, and prawns in the shade of the trees. Not to be left out, 'Scuffy', 'Woodwind', & 'Perfect Sense' took advantage of the club moorings there.

While I'm talking about the BSC I would like to thank Dennis 'Rhino' Hume, Ted Anderson, and all the volunteers for their involvement so far. Ted (NRO) and his team ran our first event there, the A-Class Catamaran Championships. Ian Michie (Class Vice President) in his letter said "All the sailors appreciated the time and effort afforded to us and as such a very successful

regatta was run. The Bay is a fabulous place to sail and hope to return and sail again."

The Tackers fleet, with 4 newly acquired boats bringing our total to 16, was all but full for the school holidays. The Lasers at Newcastle have just recommenced and from casual comments all those I have asked are happy with the new base on F-Arm.

The keelboats have also just started the summer series with 18 entered in the Twilights and 12 in the Short Ocean Pointscore. The Elliott 'Leagues' kick off a couple of days after I submit this, so more in my May missive.

We have also been working throughout the summer on our on-water assets. We have now acquired two new boats to help with the sail training on the Tackers fleet. Additionally, we have a new anchor windlass and plotter in our 'Mark Boat' while 'The Lizard' carries out all the duties at the BSC.

There are lots of events in the months ahead to look forward to including:

- Ocean Pointscore races to Pittwater and return (27/28 February) followed by the Moon Island race (14 March)
- She Sails Regatta on 6 & 7 March
- SailFest Newcastle on 10 & 11 April, and
- Newcastle to Port Stephens race on 18 April kicking off Sail Port Stephens

Personally, I do hope that all of you are doing OK through this health marathon. There are quite a few faces I have not seen in a while. I look forward to catching up.

Welcome to the Autumn edition!

What a ride we've been on again, or maybe still! Thank you to all for the support and ongoing commitment. This edition may seem short and not as eventful as previous – don't be fooled that we haven't been busy chipping away at projects

and maintenance items both old and new.

The marina occupancy has been steady with casual visitation. What has been quite notable is the turnover of boat ownership. With a handful of long-term marina occupants, departing and leaving what looks like a very empty marina. Feedback from Brokers is that stock and demand are hard to keep up with. The market has attracted punters who may usually spend

large on overseas trips and adventures. The international ship delivery has seen two arrivals, with Australian owned vessels returning 'home' as the owners are restricted by travel.

The berth numbering has been repainted and the fight with spiders in all the nooks and crannies has been somewhat a battle. These smaller maintenance jobs have been scheduled





around other major projects. The Bay Sailing Centre received a major overhaul and paint job, completed by the Marina and Maintenance team. Preferred Contractors to NCYC must get a shoutout for making the short deadline for the doors to open, being Wagner Plumbing and Denholm Electrical – THANK YOU!



In preparation for the Clubhouse extension a mammoth effort from staff and volunteers saw the site cleared in a miraculous three days. Some 360m2 of pavers were lifted in shifted in three hours — truly remarkable! We had allowed for the five working days and with careful planning and coordination the site was



ready for handover on the afternoon of day three. A huge THANK YOU to all the staff, those superstar volunteers and marina customers that contributed,

got filthy, sweated buckets, and finished the job in an unexpected record time.

We welcome Alex McKay and Matt Williams to the Marina and Maintenance team. Alex comes from Job Centre Australia and is subsidised for the ten hours weekly he helps with the maintenance and grounds and getting the site ready and ship-shape for trade on a daily basis. Matt Williams may be a familiar face to the marina customers, having worked in the boatyard. Matt is covering some of the weekend as he goes to Uni studying a Bachelor of Construction during the week. Paul Booth has taken a few weeks of leave and well earned.

We are gearing up for SailFest Newcastle Regatta (10/11 April) which is the creation of NCYC with the City of Newcastle as a major sponsor. Everyone has been busy in getting everything ready for this event which will once



more draw many boats to our marina. Shortly after SailFest, we have Sail Port Stephens feeder races, which will once more contribute to marina occupancy. With the Clubhouse extension under construction, we have had to find creative ways to thank our guests and host these events. Our team came up with a variety of creative solutions that utilises the water and other spaces that will show them how wonderful the City of Newcastle is.

Finally, in between the Bay Sailing Centre, new hires, preparing for the Clubhouse extension, and the many events, I have been busy behind the scenes preparing our Annual Fire Safety Statement in conjunction with the Fire Protection specialist, for compliance with the Newcastle City Council. Further, the annual return EPA License, will get underway shortly. This involves ground water quality testing, fuel line pressure testing and procedures reviewed. NCYC has also engaged a WHS consultant (Commercial Safety Assurance) to create standard operating procedures and necessary documentation and records. As these legislations change and are reviewed, this will then ensure NCYC and its staff are fully covered off.

Sailing Manager's Report



We've had an incredible start to the year with a surging enthusiasm from our members and the Hunter sailing community to get on the water and engage with the training and racing opportunities we're delivering at both Newcastle and Port Stephens.

That's right – we've now got our Bay Sailing Centre up and running at Seaview Crescent, Soldiers Point. Our team was up there every day throughout January opening the café and delivering learn to sail courses and discover sailing experiences to the local community. To top it all off, we hosted the A-Class Catamaran National Championship in the first week of February – including an impressive 19 foiling catamarans (flyers)! We're now also supporting the Bay's Laser fleet with three races every Sunday to be counted in a 'Club Championship' Pointscore. To date, we've had 10 to 16 Lasers on the water on any given day – made up of about 20 casual racers on the entry list.

Closer to home, our Laser fleet is also racing with similar numbers to that of the Bay – racing three races after work on Friday afternoons. The Laser fleet is now based directly in front of the clubhouse where we recently installed floating storage racks to accommodate sixteen Lasers adjacent to a large floating rigging area. To maximise rigging area, we purchased an additional floating pontoon in January to use here until we are able to relocate it at a later date.



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Our inshore Elliott Leagues are in full swing. At the time of writing this, the Open League is nearing its final race day and about half the fleet still have a chance of taking home the gold medals. In March, we will move on to the Women's League on Tuesday evenings and another Member's Match Racing Tournament on Thursday evenings.



Report - Bay Sailing Centre

G'day from Salamander Bay! NCYC opened the Bay Sailing Centre on 21 Dec 2020, including the Seaview Cafe. It has been a spectacular success. The cafe had a slower start while the word got out, but once it did, patronage increased rapidly. So much so that one



staff member has become two, sometimes three. The view is unbeatable, the coffee excellent, with some tasty treats as well. The Discover Sailing/Learn to Sail has been successful. Dennis 'Rhino' Hume instructed

a few of these and saw others from the cafe. The participants enjoyed themselves, learned a lot, and some

have expressed interest in sailing more regularly. We used a mix of the Pacer, O'pen Skiffs, and one local keelboat sailor had a stint on a Laser. The vessel/format chosen depended on the participant's perceived



capability and weather on the day. We managed to send a few more adventurous children solo on the O'pen Skiff much to their own delight and the amazement of the parents.

Regular Club sailing has a new dynamism. NCYC made it clear that regular sailing was up to the community, which has meant by local sailors for local sailors. The numbers have at least doubled if not tripled. BSC managed a local RO Sunday 17 Jan and conducted 3 races with 12 Lasers & 3 O'pen Skiffs. Jack Buchan came up Sunday 7 Feb to RO for the 1st of 8 Sunday Club Championship Days, 3 races each day, 14 Lasers. The local sailors have thoroughly enjoyed those days laughter, banter, flapping sails equals a real sailing club. The Bay Sailing Centre hosted the A Class Catamarans' National Championship with racing conducted 1 - 4 February 2021 on Salamander Bay. NCYC brought up a Steber 34 and two very capable RIBs with BSC using the red ex Surf Rescue boat and Greg Busch's runabout. 3 races were conducted Day 1 with an ENE wind hovering near 19 knots (Class limit 22). There were a few capsizes, mainly during the bearaway at the Top Mark. Buschy had a bird's eye view and described the sailors imitating a one-armed paper hanger as they eased main, vang etc. but also re trimming the foils some A Class Cats foil, and they are seriously fast! Day 2 brought rain squalls and unstable winds, but racing was underway at midday with a more moderate SSW. 3 races were conducted. Day 3 and a lighter SSE had the Top Mark affected by Wanda Wanda Head before it was relocated halfway to Corlette Point. After 2 races the breeze backed and faded so the AP was raised. Day 4 brought an early ENE and racing got underway early with 4 races conducted in wind strength 14 - 16 knots gusting 19. It was a flood tide, so wind with tide, but even so the wave action was very significant. Waves are significant for the A Class Cats - so much so it is more

significant than tide/wind in choosing on which side of

the Course to sail. I saw numerous sailors 'crash' off

The A Class Cats sail at big angles to the breeze both upwind and downwind so if they choose to 'bang the corners' they use a lot of water - Salamander Bay perfect for that, in addition to which Salamander Bay is not busy. Several sailors made the effort to thank the Officials for great racing. We look forward to many of our members coming up and enjoying the view and coffee for themselves.

COVID has changed all our lives in one way or another. Working from home, children schooling from home, loss of employment, loss of loved ones, special occasions turned upside down just to name a few.

At the Mission we have looked at alternative ideas to assist our Seafarers. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the crews have been unable to get off the ships when in Port. Their contracts have, for the most part, been extended due to not being able to return to their homelands.

To give some comfort and care to the Seafarers, we have introduced care packs for each ship. These contain magazines, chocolates, DVD's, CD's, and beanies all donated by our generous communities. Additionally, we have a Chaplain help line if the Seafarers need to chat. Our regular newsletter now goes out to our volunteers, Port users and our sponsors.

During the Christmas period there were several crew members admitted to hospital. We were able to assist them with care packs, WIFI, and regular visits, for which they were very grateful.

Normally, the crew members when able to get off the ships can enjoy some land time at the Mission as well as replenish their essentials such as toiletries and food stuffs. But all that has stopped due to COVID. During 2020 we were blessed with many donations of toiletries, chocolates, socks, and games just to name a few. At Christmas we were able to pack approx. 1,500 care packs to distribute to the ships coming into Port. For most of the Seafarers this would be the only gift they would have received at Christmas.

We are very grateful for the abundance of support the Mission has received in enabling us to assist and acknowledge the importance of these men and women who bring to our shores so many of our day to day needs. We will continue to uphold our values for the men and women of the sea with Justice, Kindness, and Humility and be thankful for the great work they do for all of us. As restrictions due to COVID-19 remain, our Seafarers will still be unable to have shore leave or return to their homeland. Therefore, we would appreciate any donations to help us continue to provide care packs and
