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Commodore's Message



Our 20th Annual General Meeting was conducted on Thursday 14 August 2014. The Board appreciates the interest shown in Club activities by those attending. I am pleased to advise that the current directors were reinstated for the 2014-2015 year.

The team consists of: Commodore: Phil Arnall Vice Commodore: Jim Holley Rear Commodore: Kym Butler Club Captain: Ernie Thirkell Treasurer: Larry Curtis Director: Tony Lobb Director: Steve Rae

The meeting highlighted significant issues relating to the 2013 - 2014 year:

- The Club produced a solid operating result in challenging times.
- We were able to pay down \$150,000 of our debt. Since 2010 the Club has reduced its debt by 50% to \$1,740,000.
- The Club added to its on and off water assets base with the purchase of equipment in the order of \$400,000.
- We continue to invest in maintaining and upgrading our assets, particularly the marina.
- Our sailing activities had a busy year and will expand further into small boat activities including sail training and development following the acquisition of the Force 24 keel boat fleet (refer to Rear Commodore's Report).



The opportunity was taken at the AGM to brief the meeting on the strategic planning process conducted by the Board over the last 12 months. Director, Steve Rae (who championed this process on the Board, with the invaluable assistance of our member Clive Jones) presented a summary of the plan. This will be available on the Club's website and has the vision to "Get Newcastle Sailing".

At its cornerstone the strategic plan addresses Club activities and Board responsibilities including:


- Building participation in sailing
- Approving and maintaining responsible financial management
- Maintaining and growing our assets
- Providing valued services to our member base

Captain Ernie Thirkell had the pleasant task of announcing Honorary Membership to Ted de-La-Garde, a long standing Race Official and fine Club Member. Unfortunately Ted was unable to attend as he was in hospital. We wish him a speedy recovery.

I would like to thank my fellow Directors for their efforts over the past year in the Boardroom and around the Club. We are fortunate to have a talented team.

Finally, I look forward to seeing a greater participation in our sailing activities for the Spring and Summer calendar.

The Club has yet again been well represented in the CYCA Landrover Sydney to Gold Coast race which started on July 25th. Three boats represented the Club in this event which is arguably the second major offshore national race to the Sydney to Hobart.

The boats had a few days of champagne sailing north. *She's the Culprit* attained a credible second in PHS with *Anger Management* a fifth in IRC Division 2. *Frantic* placed 6th in IRC Division 1.

It has been gratifying in the last few months when visiting other yacht clubs and meeting with other sailors to sense the high regard that this Club is held within the sailing community. Our constant punching above our weight in major offshore racing supplemented with the successful running of the recently held Australian IRC Championship has placed the Club in a position to further establish itself as a major blue water offshore sailing club.

I would like to welcome the newly formed Sailing Development Committee chaired by Phil Ashley-Brown. This committee will be in charge of developing new areas of sailing within the Club. However, its initial task is to develop the programs to utilise our new fleet of Force 24s. It is an exciting time in the Club. We are very grateful to RPAYC for the opportunity to purchase these boats. The boats are especially suited to training both adult and youth sailors. 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STAFF PROFILE Tayler Hoffman


Most of you would already be familiar with my face as I have been working for NCYC since July 2011 and recently was promoted to the new Functions & Events Manager.

MEMBER PROFILE Robin Hillery

Robin is the ultimate NCYC member: participating in sailing and social events; assisting with greeting other yachts entering our Marina or; volunteering his time and skill such as in the recent excursions to tow our six newly purchased Force 24's from Royal Prince Alfred Yacht Club to NCYC.

Robin's sailing experience has included skippering his own H28, *Warrrain* in NCYC races, being a delivery crewman for yachts competing in major offshore events and "Short Handed" races aboard both Warrain and Etosha. Other highlights of his short sailing career have been crewing aboard Mr Christian in the Ocean 11 race to a barbecue on Lord Howe Island, and crewing on Freyja for two consecutive trips to the National Wooden Boat Festival in Hobart.

For Robin, official sailing began at the Club with the inaugural NCYC Australia Day Regatta in 2004 – of course, *Warrain* competed in the single event, The Australia Day Cup. Our Sailing Committee was formed, we obtained an aquatic licence and in 2004 our sailing fleet consisted of 14 boats which were soon divided into two divisions so that all competitors would get in at roughly the same time. This allowed for an afternoon barbecue and drinks on the Marina while the results were done. At first, division 1 had only three yachts, with the remaining 11 comprising division 2. In division 2, Warrain raced to the IDM and back. Division 1 competitors did the same course twice.

Ever since our NCYC Rum Runners tradition was established, Robin has been one of the first to put up his hand to give a hand. In fact, he has always been a reliable volunteer whenever needed, from assisting berthing boats, to cooking barbecues.

A few weeks before the Licenced Club building was ready for occupation, members had a working bee to clear the grounds of construction rubble and lay turf. This was followed by a casual barbecue and drinks in the shade before a guided tour of the new Club. Robin and his accomplice Neal have the dubious honour of being the first and only people to dance on our Club ceiling! A horrified George Keegan noticed them walking across ceiling tiles on the floor rather than going around them: the duo danced off "with a bee in their bonnets"!

Robin was one of the small group of members who at the invitation of the licensee, John Pugh, started the

NCYC Friday Night Raffles at the "Royal Albion Yacht Club". Robin, Neal Kibble, Wally (Warren) Amos, Tom Panton and Ernie Thirkell were a dedicated team, raising money on behalf of our Club for the Westpac Rescue Helicopter Appeal. 

The club's approach to sail training and attracting new people in the sport has taken an exciting turn with the arrival of six Force 24 yachts which have been purchased from the Royal Prince Alfred Yacht Club where they had been used for training, match racing and crew development.

The boats had their first outing at NCYC on August 17 with a keen group of sailors who took them out for three very exciting races in front of the club house.

You can expect to see them out in the harbour being used in all aspects of sail training from putting up a spinnaker, to tacking, to backing a yacht into a pen (with no engine!).

To start with we're establishing a school holiday program, a program for women and a basic learn to sail course. We know there's a big demand for women's sailing and for basic learning sessions and we're hoping to get going with these as soon as we can. From there we'll look at fleet racing, creative ways of using the boats and we'll incorporate the full suite of accredited YA courses. The biggest challenge in the first place is getting our sail trainers accredited and familiar with the boats. So if you're interested in putting your hand up to get accreditation and to work as a sail trainer, let us know.

Over the next few months we're working towards Try Sailing Day which is on October 26 and we'll use the Force 24's to give members of the general public the opportunity to go for a sail. We'll also make some Lasers and yachts available on that day. Any assistance will be greatly appreciated.

Paul Gleeson will be the official starter boat for events, used for setting marks as well as a rescue boat.



The following is an extract from Captain James Cook's Journal of his first voyage Vol III describing his discovery of Nobbys Headland and discovery and naming of Port Stephens on Thursday 10th May 1770.

1770 May Monday 7 Tuesday 8	Points, bore S.W. distant five leagues. Our longitude from Botany Bay was 19 E. In the afternoon, we saw smoke in several places upon the shore, and in the evening, found the variation to be 8° 25'E. At this time we were be two and three miles from the shore, in twenty-eight fathom; and at noon the next day, we had not advanced one step into the northward. We stood off shore, with the winds northerly, till twelve at night, and at the distance of about five leagues, had seventy fathom; at the distance of six leagues we had eighty fathom, which is the extent of the soundings ; for a the distance of ten leagues, we had no ground with 150 fathom.
Thursday 10	The wind continuing northerly, till the morning of the 10th, we continued to stand in and off the shore, with very little change of situation in other respects; but a gale then springing up at S.W. we made the best of our way along the shore to the northward. At sunrise, our attitude was 33° 2'S. and the variation 8° E. At nine in the forenoon, we paffed a remarkable hill, which flood a little way inland, and somewhat resembled the crown of a hat ; and at noon, our latitude, by observation, was 32° 53'S. and our longitude 208° W. We were about two leagues distant from the land, which extended from N 41 E to S 41 W., and a small round rock, or island, which lay close under the land, bore S. 82 W. distant between three and four leagues. At four in the afternoon, we paffed, a the distance of about a mile, a low rocky point, which I called Point Stephens, on the north side of which is an inlet, which I called Port Stephens : this inlet appeared to me, from the fast head, to be sheltered from all winds. It lies in latitude 32'40, longitude 207° 51, and at the entrance are three small islands, two of which are high; and on the main near the shore are some high rounds hills, which at a distance appear like islands.

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Susan Receives Her Own Medal

Local Optometrist and Club sponsor and member Dr Susan Walton was recently awarded an Order of Australia Medal in the Queen's Birthday Honours List.

Susan has volunteered with the Special Olympics for almost 20 years and is now the Regional Clinical Advisor Asia-Pacific for the Special Olympics Lions Club International Opening Eyes Program.

Opening Eyes is a volunteer run program that performs eye examinations and provides spectacles where required for the athletes competing in Special Olympics Games at State, National and World Games. Susan has volunteered at three World Games in USA and Dublin, Ireland and has organised the program for all our Australian National Games since 2002. She especially enjoyed being involved in our recent events in Newcastle - the Junior National Games 2012 and the Asia-Pacific Games 2013.

Susan reports that since 2002 here in Australia the Opening Eyes program has tested 2061 athletes and provided them with 392 pairs of spectacles, 77 pairs of prescription sports or swimming goggles, as well as 624 pairs of fashion sunglasses to those athletes who do not need a prescription. All of the materials - frames, lenses and sunglasses are donated worldwide by large optical companies (Safilo and Essilor). Funds are provided on a worldwide basis by Lions Clubs International. Susan's job is to encourage optometrists and optical dispensers to volunteer to her team to be able to provide these services and then coordinate everything.

"Some of my volunteers are initially a little reluctant if they have not previously worked with the special needs population. However after volunteering with our Opening Eyes team they know how rewarding and enjoyable the experience is". Susan says that introducing the Special Olympics experience to her colleagues over the years has been terrific as well as sharing her passion with her husband Evan and daughter Hannah (both NCYC and volunteers at each event since 2002).

"This award was indeed a huge surprise and I feel honoured to be recognised. However the time I spend volunteering with the Special Olympics athletes, their families and coaches is always a highlight for myself and my family. They are an amazing group of people and I like to think of their abilities - not their disabilities which are truly shown

in the Special Olympics arena. There is always fun and laughter and sharing of their medals." says Susan.

The work continues as Susan is currently preparing for the SO National Games to be held in Melbourne in October this year.

To obtain an ICC, you either need to have successfully completed an RYA Day Skipper practical course or undergo a 3 – 4 hour assessment which includes your knowledge of International Collision Regulations, chart work, navigation, manoeuvring and sailing.

Midcoast Boat Yard and Marine - Hit List For the Annual Lift

Come time for the annual lift for inspection and maintenance of underwater parts, it's good practice to have a bit of a hit list ready for yourself to do DIY, or to arrange for the work to be carried out by the boat yard.

Procedure once lifted

While the underwater area is still wet it should be cleaned with a high pressure water hose and any solid growth should be scraped off. Then the hull should be visually inspected checking all through hull fittings: running gear, anodes and, the condition and adhesion of antifoul (blistering or bubbling under the paint). Note any abnormalities and seek professional advice if needed.

The hull should be thoroughly sanded with "wet and dry" paper while wearing appropriate protection. Never dry sand as the dust is highly toxic. Be sure to remove the underwater grates and scrape out the thru hull fittings to remove growth.

Underwater mechanical components should be serviced ie props and shafts/sail drives/ stem legs etc.

Tips when antifouling

Apply masking tape along the waterline in preparation for antifouling. The antifoul can be applied by roller, or professionally by spray which gives a more even and smooth finish subject to how well the surface has been prepared. Because some brands are not compatible, it is important that the same antifoul as previously used, is applied to inside the through-hull piping as well. A hard antifoul should not be applied over a soft antifoul.

There are specific areas which should be coated with a different antifoul that does not have constituents that affect the metals. These areas are: Running gear (propellers, shafts, saildrives, sternlegs) and approximately a 400mm square of the hull around the saildrive. This sometimes includes a similar area of the hull around the rudder on yachts (depending on what material the rudder stock is made of). Intake grates can be antifouled all over and refitted, and anodes replaced. In all cases with antifoul, seek professional advice if unsure.

If you are going to polish your hull topsides, it is recommended that it be done either before you start preparing the under-hull area, or the very last job before launching. This is because polish contains silicon which is the number one enemy of any boatyard painter. It prohibits the adhesion of the paint. If the boat is polished first, the silicon is sanded and washed off in the "wet and dry" preparation and process. If polished last the silicon will not affect the paint that is already applied. There are some very good silicon based antifoul systems for running gear on the market now. However, these products rely on the rotation of the propellors at least every two weeks to work most efficiently. If you do not use your boat on a regular basis seek professional advice as to which product is best suited to your needs.

Take care on the waterways and enjoy your time on your boat.

Travelling Italy/Malta/Sicilia

June - August 2014

Towering sheer above the San Fruttueso Bay and Portofino coast, this ancient sheer cliff face buttress falls into the Golfio di Genova to 12m to 15m then the bottom levels to 20m for about 200m then drops into oblivion.

Underwater, surge and kelp particles reduce visibility to about 10 - 15 metres.

Aquatic life is minimal, drab colours, a few schooling fish and mid-sized groper..... but a dive on the magnificent bronze statue of the "Christ of the Abyss" makes an early morning in the Italian Riviera a memory.

As I understand it, the monks of the 12th Century medieval Benedictine Abbey of San Fruttueso undertook to create a monument to all those who died at sea, during the wars and in particular a chap, Dario Gonzatti, the first Italian to use scuba equipment who died near this spot in 1947. The monks set about collecting (over several years) the bronze from shipwrecks and aeroplanes sunk in the Mediterranean and many individuals donating their bronze war medallions, to the monks.

The result is this 8 ft bronze statue of the "Christ of the Abyss"

It must weigh about 7 tonnes and was submerged at 17 metres approximately 1 kilometre off the beach off the abbey. (Google it... it's a great read).
