#### Rear Commodore's Report



I'm sitting at my desk wondering how to open this report. There is an old saying (curse) that U.S. President John Kennedy attributed to the Chinese – "May you live in interesting times". The Chinese people that I know have never heard it, but maybe some nuance is 'lost in translation'? The fact

remains that we ARE living in interesting times. When the COVID-19 health emergency arrived in late March/early April our sport suffered the same fate as all the others. I'll leave Steve, Valda and Paul to comment on the registered club aspects, but for me and the Sailing Committee it is, and always has been, about your safety. It's about our collective wellbeing. The consequences of getting it wrong could be devastating for anyone of us, our families, or our friends. This is about sheep stations!

We imposed strict conditions on sailing including weekly declarations and a maximum crew calculator that estimated useable deck area and ensured that at least 4m<sup>2</sup> was available for each person. Additionally, we limited sails and excluded spinnakers to minimise the close proximity requirements of the crews. Can you believe we had 17 entries and never less than 12 - 13 boats on the water for the 5-race series? Congratulations to Rob and Jan Howard's 'Schouten Passage' (IRC), Warwick Miller's 'Lumiere' (PHS D1) and Michael MacFayden's 'Pronto' (PHS D2).

I would also like to publicly congratulate the winners of the Summer Short Ocean Pointscore. As we all know, we sailed the last race without knowing we had. The honours in that series went to Warwick Miller's 'Lumiere' (IRC & PHS D1), and Andrew Miller's 'Uprising Bakery' (Red Dog) (PHS D2).

While we have results on our minds, there is a plan for presentations. Our preference is to have a relatively normal COVID Safe format, but this may be changed if the current outbreaks worsen causing reimposition of restrictions. In this case there will be a changed format, but you will receive your silverware.

Additionally, I'm keen to share with you some good news about the Sailing Season that was 2019/2020. If you attended the AGM, you have seen these numbers, but I want to ensure a larger audience hear about it. One of the headlines in the financial results (31 March 2020) was the reduction of the club finance facility (mortgage) to \$100,000. When I joined the board in April 2015 this figure was \$1,420,000. As I write to you today it is effectively \$0. There is a small amount still owing to keep the facility available for future plans. I'm not trying stealing Valda's thunder; I'm suggesting that those who don't read the Treasurer's Report should take the time. All this means we are in the enviable position of being able extend our club's sailing and other activities. Despite our 3-month COVID-19 hiatus, our total sailing was up by 104%. See the sailing results below:

### Chief Executive Officer's Report




This year has seen a most unusual winter.

I would like to firstly thank the NCYC Board and Senior Management for their continued support and encouragement during these challenging times. Also, to the Dockmaster, Marina and Maintenance team a sincere and huge thanks

for your efforts and commitment to keeping things seamlessly ticking along.

It's been an opportune time to undertake some specialty projects, over the winter months. Jan Howard and Mary Holley were clearly blessed with green thumbs and so kindly volunteered their time and gardening passions to give the potted plants in the Clubhouse a makeover. The marque resembled a garden nursery rather than a functions venue. I'm sure all would agree that the greenery in the Club and outside areas bring a distinctive class and ambiance. Thank you to the talented ladies and the maintenance team for the hard work – the green life looks fantastic!







The maintenance team have undertaken the annual tightening of the marina joints, elbows and fingers. This is a two-person project that takes a few days if the weather is favourable. It sometimes may require boats to be moved to ease pressure on T-heads and finger berths. Thankyou to any



boatowners that cooperated when asked to move.

The Supermaxi 'InfoTrack' is once again alongside for an indefinite amount of time. Since her previous stay at NCYC and very successful Sydney-Hobart campaign, she has changed ownership and is a site to behold on B dock towering over the marina. Let's see if the 2020 campaign gets off the ground for the new owner.

The rollout of the new staff uniforms commenced in July. The staff are all looking sharp and the new uniform has been well received. It will continue to be rolled out to casuals, on-water crew and administration staff in the coming months with the hope of all being kitted out before Summer. Facemasks for the Bar, functions and wait staff have been specifically manufactured. They are reusable, washable and compliant with the current COVID-19 guidelines – here's hoping that NCYC staff are that one step ahead should the case of compulsory mask wearing be implemented.

The Marina again hosted short-term berthage for many vessels heading back to international waters. In late April, there were 16 boats that had been moored at NCYC that were loaded onto the delivery ship. The bottom floor of the ship is loaded first, then a roof like structure put in place that then becomes the floor of the next level. Some fascinating photographs of inside the ship as the boats are loaded, stood and supported and secured down.



Government guidelines suggest the use of hand sanitiser and frequent handwashing are key to minimising potential spread of the Corona Virus. Each dock has a hand sanitiser dispenser installed at the inside of the dockgate. Marina guests are encouraged to use at will. There is also a dispenser conveniently located at the entrance to the Administration Office and Laundry/ amenities facilities and throughout the Club.



## Results of the AGM



We are excited to be able to finally welcome you back to your club! We will endeavour to find the perfect balance between following the mandatory safety measures in place and maintaining the atmosphere the club has become famous for.

# **Social Distancing**

All patrons are to follow Social Distancing measures we have in place and are advised that they are not to commingle with other groups. This will include No moving of furniture, remain seated when in the clubhouse and follow floor markings, signage and directions given by staff.

# Infection Control

Patrons are to wash/sanitise their hands upon entering and exiting the clubhouse, using the restrooms, blowing their nose, or coming in to contact with another person. #### Club Sailing

#### Winter Wonderland

With restrictions on sporting activities being (slightly) eased, we contested the COVID Cup throughout June and July.

There were a few requirements placed on crews including conducting a team briefing each day to



discuss how they were going to address Covid Safe sailing onboard their boat, restricting the number of persons allowed on board based on a formula to calculate available deck space compared to the 4m<sup>2</sup> guideline, racing non-spinnaker due to reduced crew numbers, and submitting a detailed crew list.

The legislation in place at the time, required crews to practice 1.5m physical distancing at all times except during manoeuvres where they are permitted to work together during tacks, gybes, hoisting sails, etc.







Going in to the final day of racing, we started the day on a three way tie for first place as the fleet raced out the harbour lead by 'Marta Jean' and 'Schouten Passage' out in front.



The first rounding mark proved challenging as we saw the first three places spread apart during the rounding, a boat collide with the buoy, and a few boats struggle to get up and around the buoy without tacking.

With the sun shining down on the race course the swell was still big from the recent East Coast Low, but each wave was spaced out by long periods and was long and rolling. Perfect conditions for smooth winter sailing!

Overall for the series in IRC Division, 'Schouten Passage' claimed the victory, followed by 'Lumiere' and 'Marta Jean'.

In PHS Division 1, 'Lumiere' took the winning title followed by 'Uprising Bakery' and 'Schouten Passage'. In PHS Division 2, 'Pronto' (newly added to the NCYC fleet) came out on top, followed by 'Paloma' and 'Nyssa'.



#### Sailing Manager's Report



S ince my last report, I'm pleased to confirm that we have in fact been back on the water. Although in a significantly reduced and restricted manner, being on the water can be considered a reward in any capacity at this point in time.

As we approach the end of the

old season and plan to begin the new, we've compared the statistics of this season to that of last season and have identified some outstanding achievements to share.

On racecourse, we conducted 462 races in the 2019-2020 period. This is up 104% from 227 races conducted in 2018-2019. Largely, this is thanks to the Club's acquisition of Olympic Elliott 6m yachts that we launched in July last year. We were able to introduce a comprehensive suite of inshore racing and regattas and expand on existing annual events.

Within the Academy, we saw similarly significant increases in participation having doubled participation in Tackers Kids Learn to Sail, Adult Discover Sailing Experiences, and Women's Sailing courses. The National Keelboat Pathway also saw sizeable increases in the Start Crewing, Start Helming and Start Skippering courses.



We're also in the process of launching a new array of courses that will enhance the offshore skillset of members including Radio Operator Certificates, Sea Safety & Survival courses, Marine First Aid, RYA Diesel Engine Course, and a Man Overboard Masterclass. Additionally, we are looking to add an array of Information Sessions by inviting guest speakers to discuss Racing Rig & Sail Trim, Racing Starts & Tactics, Blue Water Sailing Preparation, Boat Maintenance, Marine Weather, and Coastal Port Familiarisation sessions.



In lieu of the Winter Short Ocean Pointscore, we contested a modified "COVID Cup" that placed restrictions on crews in an attempt to reduce the risk of transmission associated with sailing here at Newcastle. You can find more on this five week series deeper in the magazine.

Additionally, we reactivated our Youth Academy to work with a smaller squad this year. I was joined by Felix Prince as we took on the roles of Squad Coaches throughout July and August and we pushed the squad of 13-16yr olds to their physical limits training on the Force 24s. The squad focused heavily on boat handling and using their bodyweight to assist maneuvers. We quickly raced through the fleet racing module to get to the intro to match racing module where everyone

could have some fun trying to take advantage of the rules to control their opponent. To conclude the match racing module, we conducted a mini regatta where our squad teams competed against teams led by Midcoast Boatyard's Joe de Kock, and our recent youth graduate come sailmaker Thomas Steenson.





To wrap up the youth squad, we took the squad sailing offshore on 'Mako' where they had the opportunity to demonstrate their capabilities to transfer their sailing skillset to a bigger boat with heavier loads on ropes and sails. The next step will be to see them participate aboard yachts at the NSW Country Yachting Championship coming up at the end of August. See more about the youth squad deeper in the magazine. On top of the COVID Cup, and the Youth Squad, our team of casual instructors have been silent heroes working in the Midcoast Boatvard week after week as they strip away the layers of old antifoul that has built up year after year. Weeks turned into months, and the team of Andrew Omotosho, Felix Prince, Karma Randall and Courtney Smith are persistent in their exhausting endeavor to bring new life to the hulls of the aging Force 24 fleet. They have stripped all the old antifoul off, sanded, filled, primed and antifouled a new coating that will improve their hydrodynamic hull shape and make the boats easier to sail for years to come. The proof will ultimately arrive in September when we aim to reactivate the Sailing Academy and once again provide Newcastle with access to our incredible sport.





We've also been busy checking our fleet to ensure that each boat's first aid kit contents are up to date, all of the safety equipment is onboard and accounted for, and servicing all of our fire extinguishers and inflatable lifejackets. The 'Mark Boat' has been upgraded to include a B&G Wind Plotter, and the 'Paul

Gleeson' RIB has had the transom replaced and a towing pole added. We acquired another floating pontoon to store our other RIB, we serviced all of our racing



buoys, and we replaced the tie down straps at the Elliott hardstand compound at Thales. While we'd rather be on the water, we're still maintaining productivity nevertheless and we're better prepared than ever to tackle the rapid expansion of our on-water activities in the years to come!

Finally, save the date on Sunday 13th September as we kick off the new season with the Blessing of the Fleet and the first race of the new sailing season. There will be prizes for Best Dressed Crew and for Best Dressed Boat! Be sure to jump online and submit an entry form for your boat to participate.










#### Sailing Academy Report



With our Sailing Academy activities coming to a grinding halt on the 22nd March it's been a quiet time for the Academy... but only on the water!

There has been so much going on both in terms of administration and facility management during the pandemic shut-down period.

The support of the NCYC Board and CEO Paul O'Rourke during these challenging months has been amazing and has allowed some of our instructor team to remain employed and engaged with valuable

maintenance projects. Andrew, Felix, Karma and Courtney have renovated the Academy barge and, at date of writing, almost completed all six Force 24 keelboats – scraping off years of old antifoul, stripping back to fibreglass and then reapplying fresh

antifoul. What a time consuming and messy job this has been but, what a difference it has made! Topsides, deck fittings and bilges have all had attention too.

Hoping to move forward positively, all of our Spring and Summer courses have been scheduled and online enrolments set up on the website. New course flyers are available in the clubhouse with the latest 2020/21 dates. Enrolments are open for all of our courses now with payment not due until 21 days prior to course commencement.

We have also taken time to review many of our operational policies and procedures with an important new Child Safety Strategy recently approved by the Sailing Committee and updated Emergency & Incident Management Plans in place. A new page on the website, Booking Information & Assistance, now provides loads of detail relating to Academy courses. A detailed COVID Safety Plan and supporting documentation has been developed so we are ready to operate in the safest manner possible come the Spring.

Several Tackers Catch-Up sessions are planned for September so the kids can finish off their courses which were cut short with the lock-down. The kids will then be ready to move onto their next Tackers course either in the school holidays or during term 4.

We have introduced a new Women's Spinnaker course which will run in conjunction with our usual Women's Sailing courses on Thursday evenings and Friday mornings. The first 4-week spinnaker course will begin in October. Our SheSAILS@NCYC Development



Regatta participants have been offered a free session in thus course or a 25% discount if they wish to do the full 4-weeks, after not being able to get on-water for their regatta due to a smoking southerly cancelling racing.

Our second annual Academy Graduates Development Regatta is also planned for December, with full details available in a specific article in this issue.

Reviewing the figures of our 2019/2020 season, its's easy to see why it seemed so busy! Despite being cut short due to the lock-down we achieved some significant increases in participation numbers over the period.

This year we have experienced a 92% growth in Tackers participation, a 139% increase in participation in women's courses, an overall 39% increase in the National Keelboat Program with a 25% increase in Start Crewing, a 46% increase for Start Helming and a 125% increase for Start Skippering showing our improved retention of customers. Our keelboat Discover Sailing Experiences also saw an increase in participation by 92%. Our amazing instructing team should be very proud of their hard work during the season and the quality experiences they provide. We have received some genuinely lovely feedback from our participants. Great work team!

Looking forward to 2020/2021, we are very pleased to be launching our first online course options in conjunction with Above & Beyond Boating. These courses, which we will be rolling out in the next few weeks, will provide more flexible options for our members to extend their skills and knowledge in all things sailing, boating and marine related. Please keep an eye on our weekly e-newsletter for our latest releases!

We hope that everyone stays well in these challenging times and we look forward to welcoming you for some fresh air and enjoyment through our Academy activities.

This years' Squad Structure focused heavily on boat handling as they implemented those skills into fleet racing, and an introduction to match racing.




The squad is scheduled to end at the end of August with each squad member participating in the offshore NSW Country Yachting Championship aboard NCYC yachts.

On Sunday 16th August, the Youth Squad took advantage of Sydney-Hobart yacht 'Mako' and braved the wind and the ocean to sail down the coast in a training exercise. While it was a clear and sunny day, the wind at Nobby's did exceed 25knots+ in the gusts!

The squad - ranging in ages from 13yrs to 16yrs - met our squad coaches Jack Buchan & Felix Prince at 8:30am for a safety briefing onboard the yacht and to rig the sails. They raised the sails near Honeysuckle and continued out of the Harbour before turning South toward Merewether. At Merewether, the boat headed out to sea approximately 2 Nautical Miles and then worked upwind into the 20knots+ westerly until they could almost step off onto Merewether Baths. The team then

stuck close to shore as they reached across the breeze from Merewether to Nobbys and back again - rotating crew roles on each run.

Buchan summed up their day on the water as "an exciting morning on the water as "an exciting morning on the water. The squad successfully implemented their Force 24 keel boating skills and applied them on the









much bigger Mako, handling the bigger loads on ropes and sails safely."

Prince added "We had some fast runs, at over 12knots+ in some of the biggest gusts out there. The squad demonstrated their capabilities today and we're really proud of each of them."

From here, the squad is scheduled to participate offshore in the NSW Country Yachting Championships 29/30


The half-day Training Morning will be held on Saturday 5th December with the Racing Day the following Saturday,12th December.

I absolutely love the maintenance record of the boat and




We inherited the name 'Pronto', and we really like it. It means 'quickly' in Italian which is a little misleading as she's only quick in 10-15 knots of wind.

## Marine Rescue Newcastle

It has been an exciting period for members of Marine Rescue Newcastle, with the operational debut of our new rescue boat, a prestigious national honour for our Unit Commander and the announcement of a site for a new, permanent unit base.

Unit Commander Ron Calman was awarded the Emergency Services Medal in the Queen's Birthday Honours List. The ESM is awarded to members of the emergency services in recognition of distinguished service.

Ron has served our community for more than six decades, including over 35 years with Marine Rescue NSW and our predecessor services, the Australian Volunteer Coast Guard Association, and the Royal Volunteer Coastal Patrol. A skilled and respected rescue vessel master, Ron has conducted hundreds of rescue missions, often in dark and dangerous conditions. He has also been involved in all aspects of volunteering, including training, management, and fundraising. I could not think of a better recipient for this honour.

Our members have welcomed the announcement that a new long-term base has been found for our unit on the Stockton foreshore after five years without a permanent home. We are grateful to the organisations that have provided us with temporary facilities during this time, including most recently, of course, the Newcastle Cruising Yacht Club, but this announcement means we can proceed with the development of a purpose-built base bringing together our radio and vessel operations.

A Crown Land parcel of land managed by the City of Newcastle is proposed to become our new home under a peppercorn lease, pending Council approval.

The 700sqm base will be built just a few metres from South Stockton boat ramp, at a projected cost of about \$1 million, funded thanks to a State Government \$37.6 million four-year investment in Marine Rescue NSW.

"We are delighted to have found a suitable long-term home for Marine Rescue after working closely with them to find temporary bases since their former site at Shepherds Hill was severely damaged by a super storm in 2015," Lord Mayor Nuatali Nelmes said.

"This new site on the edge of the Hunter River at the end of King Street gives the volunteers immediate access to the Hunter River to continue keeping Newcastle's boating community safe both inside and outside the harbour."

Marine Rescue NSW Commissioner Stacey Tannos thanked both Newcastle City Council and the State Government for their support for the unit's volunteers.

"The base will feature the latest marine communications technology and equipment. Having the unit's new rescue vessel right in front of the base will also improve crews' response times so they can be on the scene of an emergency even faster," he said.

#### **ON THE WATER**

With our coronavirus operational and training restrictions eased, Marine Rescue Newcastle members have been busy on the water since the last edition of Thirty Two Fifty Five. Our training has included crew inductions on our new vessel and night and day exercises using the sophisticated electronic aids on board, including the radar, plotter, AIS, Autopilot, and FLIR equipment. But before the 10m Naiad Newcastle 30 (NC 30) entered service, our old Kevlacat workhorse, the superseded NC 30, successfully completed five final missions:

- May 20: A boater on a 5.2 metre vessel that would not start about 2nm off Redhead was towed to the North Stockton ramp. Radio operator Rick Nevile and crew members Ron Calman and Mick Quill.
- June 06: A 6.5m boat stranded at North Reef with two people on board was returned to North Stockton ramp. Radio operator Stuart Lawson and crew members Terry Reynolds, Mick Quill and Paul Hardie.
- June 12: Four people on board a 6.3m boat that had broken down just off Newcastle were rescued and returned safely to the North Stockton ramp. Radio operator Don Roser and crew members Ron Calman and Rick Nevile.
- June 16: A 10m vessel lost power about 1nm south-east of Merewether Beach was towed to Carrington ramp. Radio operator Rick Nevile and crew members Ron Calman and Bill Johnston.
- June 21: Three people, including two children, were on a 6.8m boat when the gear box failed about 100m off Nobbys Head. With the boat close to the surf zone, radio operator Jon Dicker asked the skipper to advise immediately if the anchor started to drag. NC 30, with Ron Calman, Lyn Van Homrigh, Mick Quill and Matthew Doyle on board, made best speed to the scene, however, just as the rescuers arrived, the skipper got the boat into gear and moved to safety. This was the final operation undertaken by our Kevlacat NC 30.

By the end of June, the new NC 30 was operational and its first mission came on June 28, when it was tasked to assist a 5.5m half cabin runabout that was reported to have its anchor line fouled around its propeller close to shore about half a mile east of Bar Beach in a sizable swell. Radio operator Bill Johnston deployed the crew, Terry Reynolds, Lyn Van Homrigh, Stuart Lawson, Dianne Hammond and Rick Nevile. On scene, they discovered the line was to a fishing pot line and not the vessel's anchor line, which the skipper managed to free.

Six days later, Ron Calman and Mick Quill rescued a ski boat stuck on a sandbank 2nm upriver from the Stockton Bridge. As the crew was returning from Raymond Terrace, radio operator Helen Carter reported that a yacht was in difficulty 2nm off the entry to Newcastle, with a

crew member reported to be suffering chronic seasickness. NC 30 rendezvoused with the yacht and took it under tow to the Cruising Yacht Club.

We have all been in very troubled times as a nation since COVID-19 arrived on our

shores. Each of us has a story to tell of the impact this time of turmoil presents. We have all had much to endure; personally, professionally, and financially.

Our regular practice involves seafarers being picked up from their ships and the crews enjoying some land time at the Mission and local shops. This allows them to feel some normality in conversation with other people.

With the Mission changing its operating hours instead of closing, recommendations of staff and volunteers coming in to the centre, no ship visits through to crew members being unable to come off when in port, we have had to look at things differently.

Presently we are filling approximately thirty care packs each week with items such as chocolates, magazines, scripture readings, letters from our wonderful volunteers, DVDs, CDs, jigsaws, knitted beanies, and many other donations from our local community. These 'goodies' help crew members know the people of Newcastle are with them through this tough time.

We are screening online weekly faith reflections,



offering online shopping for the crews, and importantly providing emotional support through our digital chaplaincy. Over the past months there have been some very sad events concerning our seafarer family.

These times not only include being unable to get off the ships and not getting home, but also not able to support their families. All these issues accumulate resulting in much frustration, sadness, and emotional distress.

What we have been able to do all this through the generosity of our local Churches and community groups such as the NCC family. The seafarers are forever grateful for the support you have given. Thank you for your ongoing support.

You may have noticed the new \$1 donation stand at the bar. We are extremely grateful for the opportunity to have this facility in the club as a practical way of raising desperately needed funds for the centre. We look forward to sharing more positive news the next time we meet.
