

only were boats not positioned correctly in their berths via the use of their lines and springers but some boats had old or worn lines on them which were at risk of breaking. I recommend all boat owners check their lines, replace them where necessary and regularly check the positioning of the boats in their berths. While not NCYC's responsibility marina staff will provide additional lines on boats if required with the cost being passed on to the boat owner. If you need some advice on how to correctly tie up your boat in its berth please call NCYC's marina staff and book in a time to meet them at your boat for some advice and assistance.

I would also like to welcome Melissa Archer and her team at Archer Business Consultants to NCYC's commercial centre. A small profile regarding Archer Business Consultants is provided on page 7.

On another note, members may be interested to know





Laser Sailing at NCYC

Achance conversation on the rail of "Summer Salt" during a Twilight race in 2010, lead to the first "foray" into Laser sailing at the NCYC. Phil Ashley-Brown was sharing his frustrations of trying to get some Friday night Laser sailing happening on Lake Macquarie and "newcomer" John Searl was discovering there was limited opportunity for his family to sail Lasers locally.

Follow up conversations aboard Anger Management shortly after, had Richie Arnall and Paul Rees on board and Commodore Phil keen to back the idea. 2011 daylight saving saw three to four boats turning out regularly on Friday nights in what could be loosely termed "racing". The YA rule book didn't play much of a role in these early days, with those more worried about their boats normally being the ones backing down to avoid collisions. The courses were normally decided "on the run" depending on the weather, enthusiasm of the sailors, and the lure of the NCYC Friday night drinks. Club Captain Ernie was a regular supporter on the start boat and did a great job of getting things rolling.

The only goal in 2011 was to circulate and keep pushing the idea to as many people as possible, believing we had the right idea and that others would agree. The support of the NCYC Sailing committee and CEO Richard Howard has been fantastic from the outset with their belief in the concept and support of Laser sailing with the club's resources.

2012 has seen the fleet reach a record 11 boats, regulars from 2011 combining with existing members who have bought boats. Ernie was sick of watching from the Start boat and against advice from numerous medical experts, bought a Laser for himself and is racing keenly. Visiting sailors from Port Stephens and throughout the Hunter have also joined the fleet, with more joining each week.

Skirts benefit from Day Skipper Course

Due to the increasing numbers of Skirts sailing at NCYC Jan Howard and Mary Holley thought their general sailing knowledge and seamanship skills would benefit with some formal sailing qualifications. After looking at several options they decided to undertake the Royal Yachting Association Day Skipper (RYA) Course with Chris Griffiths from Master Class, Lake Macquarie.

Maureen Rae and Helen Griffin decided to join them for the 5 day practical course on board Chris' 42 foot Catalina, "Sea.G." The course would begin at Lake Macquarie then proceed to Port Stephens for 2 days and back to the lake via Newcastle. Unfortunately, due to family reasons Jan and Helen had to postpone their booking for a later date and Chris was left at the mercy of Maureen and Mary for 5 days.

Their first taste of the learning curve ahead was the tricky manoeuvre off the short lee wharf at Coal Point and other advice on various berthing techniques in adverse and changing conditions. Safety is a key component of this course and their first day involved honing their seamanship skills and covering emergency equipment and procedures. They practiced man overboard, berthing, anchoring and boat handling in Lake Macquarie before settling in for the night and

preparing their pilot and passage plan for Port Stephens. Under Chris' guidance they built on their course theory and previous sailing experiences to prepare succinct and accurate navigation plans that could be interpreted readily by other crew. They were ensuring their position could be reckoned at any given time and that they could make passage safely whether at night in a narrow channel or in a busy harbour in heavy fog. They were able to navigate blindly along contour lines relying only on good communication and mapping skills which reinforced the need for accurate chart work.

The week also incorporated practical use of tide tables and tidal curves, plotting a course to steer and GPS navigation. Chris also gave them many useful tips on buoyage and pilotage as well as an introduction to weather patterns and synoptic charts. These valuable skills enabled them to be more effective and efficient Skippers and crew for both cruising and racing.

It was not all hard work though. It was perfect winter sailing conditions and the whales and dolphins escorted them on their passages. The trip was well catered, the company was good with lots of laughs and pleasant evenings were spent "debriefing" over a glass of wine.

The Day Skipper course is designed for both motor boat and yacht skippers and crew, is internationally recognised and required if chartering boats in Europe. There is an online theoretical component which is recommended prior to undertaking the practical course. Chris is an excellent instructor; his approach is professional and inspires confidence. Mary and Maureen found this Master Class course invaluable and well worth undertaking.



Recent Regattas

Forgacs Defence Inner Spring Regatta.

NCYC was the Organising Authority for the two day regatta comprised of two divisions, each closely contested on the waters off Newcastle. There was a social twilight race to precede the regatta on the Friday evening.

The Farr 40 Division consisting of four races held over two days was the first event for this class to be held at NCYC. The Cruising Division comprised two Performance Handicap (PHS) races.

Organisers were delighted with the response from the NSW sailing community for the Farr 40's, with one entrant coming from each of five prestigious Yacht Clubs. Clubs represented were: Cruising Yacht Club of Australia (CYCA), Middle Harbour Yacht Club (MHYC), Royal Sydney Yacht Squadron (RSYS), Royal Prince Alfred Yacht Club (RPAYC) and of course Newcastle Cruising Yacht Club (NCYC).

The Farr 40 Division

Race 1 was won by "Enigma", skipper G. Adshead from CYCA. The elapsed time difference for the fleet was a few seconds off eight minutes. This was shaved down in subsequent races. Race 2 winner was again "Enigma" with a fleet elapsed time difference of 04:04. Race 3 "Enigma" continued her willing streak, with the fleet crossing the finish line within 04:32. Race 4 "Estate Master", skipper M. Page from MHYC. The entire fleet was across the finish line in 05:31. Series results were "Enigma" (G. Adshead CYCA) 1st. "Estate Master" (M. Page MHYC) 2nd, "Forty" (S. Hill RSYS) 3rd.

PHS (all entrants from NCYC)

Race 1 was won by "Warrain", skipper R. Hillery. The elapsed time difference for the fleet was 16:00 which converted to 00:57 on handicap corrected time. Race 2 was again won by "Warrain", with only 11:15 separating the fleet as it crossed the finish line. Handicap corrected time converted this to 03:12. Series results were "Warrain" (R. Hillery) 1st, "Woodstock" (L. Croft) 2nd, "Tamarillo" (R. Knights) 3rd.

Sailing the Southeast Wind - SYDNEY TO SINGAPORE APRIL/MAY 2012



Part 1 Pre Departure By Peta Broadbent

We travelled to Pittwater on Friday 13th April to prepare for our delivery. As this is traditionally an unlucky date to start any passage, we planned on leaving the next day. We were taking "Pyrenees", a Jeanneau 50 DS, to Singapore from RMYC. She is a pretty boat, built in 2009 and shipped out from France.

The owner has converted the second water tank to a reserve fuel tank, and fitted a watermaker and AIS for the passage. The southeast trade winds had started to blow from about the Whitsundays, and we expected the passage to take about seven weeks. Our scheduled stops were to be Mackay, Port Douglas, the Torres Strait and Darwin.

We familiarised ourselves with the boat, checking and re-stowing lockers, ensuring all necessary ship's documents were on board and located any manuals we thought we may need. We put up the sun awning which fills in between the dodger and bimini, did engine and genset checks, and shopped for provisions.

"Pyrenees" has a main forward cabin with en suite and two double quarter berths which share a combined head/ shower. The saloon is light and airy and the galley has a large fridge and separate freezer. We reckoned we would be quite comfortable on this passage!

14th April

Martin from BME arrived to replace the filters in the watermaker and go through the operation with us. This one runs off the 12 volt system meaning we didn't have to run the genset to make water. We moved to the fuel wharf and were happy to find that the tanks were full. The weather forecast was for 15 - 20 kt NE winds with a southerly change due Monday.

BIG CLEAN UP

Newcastle yachting and boating enthusiasts have been given a gentle reminder about the importance of ensuring rubbish is properly disposed as a result of the annual Stockton Beach clean up.

matched the 2011 clean up of 7.5 tonnes.


Stockton Beach is on the doorstep of the Port of Newcastle and a popular destination for campers, fishers and recreational vehicles. The Corporation encouraged volunteers to contribute a few hours on the last Sunday of October to help clean up our local coastal environment.

NPWS organiser, Tony DeMamiel, said old camp sites, discarded buoys, rope, fishing line, nets, plastic items and bottles were collected by the volunteers.

Among those who helped were quad bike riders, members from the Range Rover Club of NSW who travelled from Sydney and the Central Coast, and four-wheel drive club members from as far as Port Macquarie.

The Stockton Beach Clean Up is one of many community environmental events and organisations sponsored by Newcastle Port Corporation. Waterfront Property Security

Then addressing the seminar at NCYC organized by Senior Constable Mark Bird, Senior Constable Paula Trevitt strongly recommended to owners of waterfront properties that they check out the Police web site. www.police.nsw.gov.au/community issues/ crime prevention/marine crime

By using this link, NCYC club members with waterfront properties can download the "Marine Security Assessment form. This lists six questions with a yes, no, or N/A response, and room to comment. By focusing your awareness on pertinent features you are assisted to self-assess your level of security. This is followed by valid tips to assist you to maximize the safety of your property.

Suggested Treatments—Waterfront Properties

- Consider installing security and/or sensor lighting between your property and the water
- Keep trees and shrubs trimmed to reduce concealment opportunities and increase visibility of the waterfront from the property.
- Create a visual barrier between your property and the water to identify where your private property starts.

- Ensure a physical barrier such as a gate and padlock is erected at the beginning of your mooring, to prevent thieves gaining access to your boat, and it will also restrict those wanting to leave your home via the water.
- Consider some type of identification marker, so you can establish from the water the identity of your property. For example the name of your home may be constructed as a sign on your waterfront property entry point.



ON THE BRIDGE with Paul McCrath

Solution: Bridge is a game of counting. So, let's begin. West holds at least ten cards in the minors. Therefore, West can hold no more than three cards in the majors (hearts and spades). So, it is highly likely that East holds the heart king as well as length in spades. Further, East holds at most three clubs and possibly just two, unlikely less given they bid to 5C. Once you have figured out all of this then perhaps you might see that you should duck the club king lead. After that, win whatever West continues, cash the trump jack, cross to hand with a diamond, draw trumps and take the heart finesse. The remaining club loser in your hand can be discarded on dummy's top hearts. Ducking the first trick is essential to survival. If you win the first club trick then when East wins the heart king a club can be returned and down you go to a watery grave (see full



Our Maritime City

Over the past few years a growing number of members have suggested that articles and photos relating to aspects of the history of our harbour and the city centre, would be valuable additions to our journal. Unlocking Newcastle's forgotten past

An innovative app for smart phones and tablets that can transport people back to 19th Century Newcastle at the flick of a finger has been developed locally. University of Newcastle School of Architecture researchers, Dr Tessa Morrison, Nicholas Foulcher and Dr Helen Giggins, developed the augmented reality application. Digital "layers" of text and images are displayed on an interactive map, bringing the interesting architecture and historic scenes such as tall ships at the wharves, of a forgotten era to life.

"To see these extraordinary images, anyone can download a free application (Layer Reality App) to their smart phone or tablet device which allows them to roam the city's streets, point at a site and get a window into the past, all at the flick of a screen," Dr Morrison said.

The researchers painstakingly scanned the image database of the University's Cultural Collections library and have been able to pinpoint with much accuracy each historical photo to its present-day location.

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The modern day scene disappears, fading. In its place are images of what was there in the 1800s.

Newcastle's Victorian History

Newcastle was first settled in 1801 and with a population of 1000, was declared a city in 1847. By the late 1870s, Newcastle was the industrial heart of New South Wales, a badge the city still wears with pride nearly 150 years later.

Making headlines as the first city to become electrified in the 1890s, Newcastle¹s epicentre and promenade, Hunter Street, was described in the Illustrated Sydney News as the "The George Street of Newcastle" by Sydney folk as tales spread of the shopping strip few colonial country towns could boast. On Saturday nights, when it was seen at its best and brightest, Hunter Street enjoyed throngs of shoppers and loungers who turned out after supper to socialise.

By the end of the 19th century Newcastle was a bustling city with significant stone buildings, hotels with broad verandas and a thriving commercial centre. The city¹s energy, its growth, commerce and industry were comprehensively photographed at the time by photographer Ralph Snowball and his images have kindly been made available through the University of Newcastle Cultural Collections.

Turkish Holiday - Part 3

Turkey, a great place to visit Article and images by Dick & Margaret Lees

Our previous articles about a wonderful three weeks in Turkey took us from Gallipoli to Bodrum and then aboard our previously hired 27 metre, two masted Gulet "Arielle" for a cruise. The holiday continues.

The coast consists of two steep gulf openings to the Aegean on the West. The nights were spent at Kara Ada Island, just east of Bodrum, Aopartne, Datea, Bogburum, Loryma, Boncik and Ora Island.

Knidos is a ruined city state at the tip of the peninsula dividing the two gulfs and Kos which was its great rival in ancient times. Rhodes is nearby. Loryma has an elliptical wall that was a massive fortification going back approximately 3,000 years ago and is still impressive. The mountainous country is mainly sparsely wooded with farms in

the valleys. It is worth looking at Google Earth to get a feeling for it.

Turkey has very few large islands in the Aegean. We could see the Greek ones, but we would have needed a special visa to visit. The Greeks and Turks don't like each other very much. The Ottoman Empire controlled Greece until independence in 1832. We didn't know

that at the end of World War 1 the Turks had not only lost their empire, but Turkey itself had been largely carved up by the Greeks, French, Italians and Armenians which left only a small area around Ankara in central Anatolia in their control.

The Greeks invaded in 1920 with the idea of recreating the Byzantine Empire but were soundly and spectacularly defeated by armies led by Kamal Ataturk, of Gallipoli fame. When a peace treaty was signed in 1922 ending the Turk's war of independence, the Greeks took most of the islands.

Margaret and I would recommend a cruise of the Turkish Coast as an alternative to cruising the Greek Islands or the Coast of Croatia. There are all sorts of ways to do it such as by Gullet with a crew, or shared with others. A yacht can be chartered with a skipper or as a bare boat.

Turkey is a great place to visit. The people are friendly and interesting. Enough speak English to make communication easy. The scenery is beautiful and the history and evidence of it is fascinating. We were there in September which is their spring. The weather was warm but comfortable. To most of us one of the most important things is that it is affordable.


