

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#### **Rear Commodore's Report**



I walked into our club this morning and was quite taken by its activities. Our Sailing Academy Manager, Jacquie Ellis was conducting the briefing for our women's Helly Hansen "She Sails @ NCYC" Open F24 event. After the briefing I shared a coffee with our two International

Judges Damien Boldyrew and Ian Humphries. All this while we watched a "conga line" of about 6 of the Optis in the "Tackers" fleet get towed from F Arm with varying degrees of compliance from the very young helmspersons with respect to staying in line with the boat ahead. Great stuff! Meanwhile on F Arm the F24s were sailing out as our Sailing Manager, Jack Buchan was busy getting the race management underway. On the footpath people were pausing their walks or rides to watch the activities.

The 6-race series of "She Sails" finished with Mooloolaba YC taking 1st and 2nd and NCYC's Janease Graham, Oonagh O'Donovan, Belinda Davey & Tracie Jones taking 3rd. Congratulations to the prize winners and also to all the women that participated.

Over the past 3 weeks our club's ocean-going yachts have conducted races in the ICOM Ocean Pointscore to Anna Bay (40 miles), Moon Island (25 miles) and a Soldiers Point overnight (30 miles each way). THIS is what our club is about and I'm sure our Founding Members envisaged such a future. Three of the four races above were conducted in 20-30 knots and the Soldiers Point race was predominately downwind both ways. Throw in the hospitality of Port Stephens Yacht Club and dinner at "The Deck"; well, it was a great weekend. If you want to compete in the long offshore classics, these races are where you need to start or refresh your skills. We have had 11 entries and 8 boats sailing regularly in what remains a tight series with 3 boats tied for third.

The Lasers have sailed 14 races since starting after Daylight Saving began. There are 24 entries in the series with approximately 15 sailing regularly. There are patterns developing with some consistent results but it's too soon to make any predictions. Our Keel Boat Twilights have seen 14 boats racing with 7 regulars and this appears to vindicate our change of day to Friday, but we will keep watching. The Spring Keel Boat series has 3 races remaining and is also very tight in all 3 divisions. With 3 races to go and 7 boats in each PHS division it's great to enjoy both the numbers on the water and the comradery. It's Ocean Classic time of the year and two NCYC boats will be on the start line of the Rolex Sydney Hobart this year; Sibby Ilzhofer's "Dare Devil" and Michael Martin's "Frantic". Your club sends you and your crew our very best and wishes you fair winds and following seas.

This summer sees 10 years since our clubhouse opened and it will be 25 years since the inaugural meeting of our members on 8 February 1994. There is a lot to be proud of as we reflect on their vision. Enjoy being with your friends and family during Christmas and the New Year!

earned a starting spot at the Harken International for the first time. This is a significant achievement the whole club should be proud of.


The Social Committee organised another fantastic Seafood and Semillon dinner and have great plans to celebrate the 10-year anniversary of the licensed club and Christmas.

#### Marina & Assets Manager's Report



2018 has been a dynamic and evolving year in the marina and general precinct. Again, peak visitation throughout the seasons, with many visiting transient vessels including international visitors and many friendly and familiar faces who make the routine migrations, similar to that of the whales, up

and down the East Coast. The underlying tone from all visitors, seems to be that of positive compliment of the excellent facilities and friendly atmosphere here at Newcastle Cruising Yacht Club!

Reservations for the Christmas/New Year period sees two flotillas finalising their numbers who will stay alongside for the '5-day in between' period to enjoy all on offer from the area, including activities, regional excursions and of course all that the Hunter Valley offers. These groups have also confirmed reservations

in the Club for New Year's Eve Celebrations. Of course, the usual summer trade ramps up during December-January.

Focus on environmental considerations and reducing our footprint on waste and how we can contribute to the war on waste has bought about significant changes. Glass only bins were introduced to each dock and the club bar. A contractor collects the glass and produces a sand-like byproduct. Of course, any glass that can be recycled, is and not converted into the 'glass sand'. The knock-on from this has been less weight in skip bins, reducing clearances to twice weekly (usually 3 times, weekly). Conscious efforts are made to separate all recyclables into appropriate bins is made and educating boat owners and commercial tenants to do similar is ongoing. The Newcastle City Council orchestrated a port-wide litter pickup, involving business that predominantly located along the water-front, in which NCYC staff took part in April 2018.

An emergency response procedures manual has been developed and is currently being fine-tuned. It is intended that this document be a comprehensive 'go to' flipchart that identifies who is trained to respond and co-ordinate any evacuation or emergency response. As the business is a rotational 7-day/week operation, specific instructions will be produced (eg specific for the bar, restaurant, dockmaster role, administration) and included in new staff induction processes. Emergency Warden and Fire Fighting training was completed in October, with Candice Reed (Bar & Functions Manager), Paul Booth (Maintenance) and myself, along with representative from Midcoast Boatyard and Marine. Hand-in-hand with this, a training matrix will be produced with first aid training completed before end of December. First Aid is paramount given the public foot traffic, visitors/guests to the bar and club and onwater activities.

#### History of the NCYC Social Committee Tenacity Award By Gloria Thirkell

The fifth successful nominee for the Tenacity Award was Tony Purkiss, skipper of "Etosha". Having decided that they wanted to form a Yacht Club in Newcastle, our founders, George Keegan and Paul Hannan set about making that happen. They were tenacious in following that goal. Those foresighted people who became the founding members of Newcastle Cruising Yacht Club in February of 1994, and those who joined soon after, fought on tenaciously to achieve the first of their goals, the opening of Stage 1, in February of 2004.

In that year the NCYC Social Committee decided to establish a Tenacity Award to recognise those members who demonstrated a continuation of that determination, taking hold of a goal and with perseverance, achieving it.

At first the awards were for humourous events demonstrating tenacity. The award has over the years grown into something much more. In these articles we have again given recognition to: Colin Jordan, skipper of "Sienna", (2004); Robin Hillery, skipper of "Warrain" (2004); Sibby and Ivan McFadyen, coowners of "Funnelweb", (2004) and; Glenda Arnall, skipper of "Felix Ventures" (2005).

It was announced at the Sailing Presentation of Trophies and Prizes evening in April 2006 that the fifth successful nominee for the Tenacity Award was Tony Purkiss, skipper of "Etosha".

The reasons behind Tony's nomination for the Tenacity Award were:

- 1. Tony was critically injured during the Bali Bombing, 1 October 2005.
- 2. On 27 November 2005, only 8 weeks later and still obviously the worse for wear, our unstoppable Tony was out at the start line at sea (aboard

3. This was soon followed by Tony, now certifiably blind, regularly joining crews to participate in our events. Tony is another NCYC member who demonstrates inspirational tenacity in achieving his goals.



The Spring Short Ocean Pointscore started strong this season with thirteen yachts competing in the Spring Edition of the Annual Pointscore Series. the first handful of races in the series proving challenging with rough seas and strong breeze.

This season we made some changes to the calendar to deliver the Icom Ocean Pointscore. It's fantastic to see the number of competitors for this series almost double since last season – perhaps in favor of the condensed format with three consecutive weekends for the Anna Bay Race, Moon Islet Race and the Port Stephens weekend where the Cruising Fleet joined us for our race to Port Stephens on the Saturday and back to Newcastle on the Sunday.



Another change to the NCYC sailing calendar this year is that we have just one big Twilight night. As of this season, our Offshore Twilight race and our Laser Twilight racing are both scheduled for Fridays! Both have proven successful with the number of regular competitors increasing for the Friday Twilight racing in both fleets. Join us in the Club on Fridays as it fills with competitors after racing – perhaps just in time for the raffles! Excitingly, this isn't the biggest change to our 2018-2019 sailing calendar. . .

The biggest change to our 2018-2019 sailing calendar will be the addition of Inshore Twilight Racing on our near new fleet of Elliott 6m One Design yachts. The Elliotts are destined to reinvigorate the concept of yacht racing here in Newcastle offering a unique competition to local sailors.





The Elliotts are welltravelled, well-equipped, and well-presented having been commissioned for the 2012 London Olympics. The boats have sailed five regattas in total since new – including the Olympic Games where the Australian Team consisting of Olivia Price, Nina Curtis and Lucinda Whitty brought



home a Silver Medal for the Women's Match Racing competition.

With the boats identical, in as new condition, the racing here at Newcastle is forecast to be fast-paced, fun and exciting with several twilight comps on the drawing board including:

- Tuesday Night She Sails Women's Twilight Racing
- Wednesday Night Open Comp
- Thursday Day 2 Up Series (2 people, 2 sails, 2 laps, 2 races)
- Thursday Night 20/20 Series (20 minute races, for crews aged 29 and under)

Dale Sharp cleaned up Division two "So Farr" in the Lake Macquarie based Farr 31 with wins in races one and two. Len Laver's "Archambault 40" just two points behind with a couple of second places on the scorecard.

In Division 3, Newcastle local Valda Johnston and the "Scots Wha Hae" Team brought it home with two wins with Richard Fleck's "Scuffy" fighting hard in second place.

**T**GFC is looking forward to another big year with the water starting to warm up & the baitfish starting to gather on the continental shelf east of Newcastle. NGFC have a lot of events in the planning stages and we had a very successful Sportsman Lunch held at the NCYC on Friday 31st August 2018 featuring a soccer legend Michael Bridges. We had over 60 people attend & by all reports, had a great day!! On Saturday 27th October, Paul Hardy & son Max Hardy (junior angler) Headed out of Port Macquarie to try their luck. Max managed to land an 82kg Yellowfin Tuna after over 2 hours on 60kg gear. It is a pending Australian & NSW record !!! Max was exhausted after this but decided to put the lures back out & hooked up to an estimated 200kg Blue Marlin which, I am not sure how excited Max was to fight this one as well. To Max's relieve, it got off after a short time.

We are looking forward to the annual East Coast Classic Tournament on March 8th, 9th & 10th 2019 - We will be holding the this out of beautiful Newcastle Harbour with the briefing & events being housed at the NCYC. We will also be catering for the berthing of the fleet at the Newcastle marina. We normally attract 50 - 70boats & over 200 anglers. Upcoming events will include, Christmas get together on 22 December and cruising the Hawkesbury over the Christmas/New Year break.



2019 will see an expanded Youth Squad Program to provide graduated levels of coaching based on the sailors skills and experience. There will be a keelboat program of skill development for all levels for sailors under 23 years. 2019 will also see the introduction of two match racing events, the Crackerjack Cup and the Thirkell Trophy – Newcastle Youth Match Racing Championship, to complement our Newcastle Youth Keelboat Championship which was raced for the first time this year.





Over the last few years at the NCYC, we have been creating a number of courses, training squads and events to provide some new and exciting pathways for young sailors of our region who are wanting to get into sailing and also to progress into keelboat racing.

#### A Delivery to Hell

#### **BOAT DELIVERIES/CRUISING IS NOT ALWAYS FUN AND ASKING FRIENDS TO HELP IS CRIMINAL**

A fter spending a week trying to organise crew to deliver "Triton" from the Gold Coast to Sydney, I enlisted (conned) some Newcastle mates including Paul O'Rourke, Jack Buchan, Phil "Bung" Burns and a mate of his to help deliver the boat.

While the forecast had a bit of South in it early on it was due to go through the east, I decided to push ahead as

flights were already booked to get us up there!

We were looking forward to plenty of this:

Arriving in the Gold Coast and receiving a phone call from Sydney crew member Kenny, where he expressed concerns with the weather, I decided to review our position later that night.



We also received news that Bung's mate had pulled out – Happy days for me as with only five (5) delivery crew I could now have two watches of 2 people with me floating and cooking. I have done that before so was looking forward to plenty of sleep and resultant bed sores and nick-name "Captain Pocock" rather than selfnamed "Captain Jack Sparrow"

We arrived after 6pm and that is when things started going wrong. There was no security key left for us and the marina office closed at 5pm. Luckily, I had the assistance of a crew member from another boat to get access to the Marina. With two (2) crew to still arrive I despatched Paul to do boat things and "Bung" to provision the boat with food. I was stuck with having to put all the racing sails below after they were left on deck to dry out on the rough and wet delivery to the Gold Coast from Hamilton Island. After stashing the sails and realising that there were 20 cases of beer and a case of wine left onboard after "Hammo, I again thought, "Happy Days".

Then off to Dinner to a Thai restaurant on Main Beach. "Bung" did a great job of over catering and returned to the boat with leftovers enough to feed four (4) people. Having regard to this I had no reason to check what he provisioned the boat with.

A post dinner decision was made by this autocrat to press on in the early hours of the morning. The forecast was still for 20knt southerly till noon, but the tide required was 3am or 3pm so still dulled by what we consumed the previous night I thought it would be better to go early. Wrong again; departing Southport bar had surf either side of us, a short sharp swell on the nose and a head wind just over 20knts. The empty race vessel pounded and shuddered a slow track to the south. The weather was foul, and winds stayed in the south and increased up to 30 knots on the nose accompanied by rain and cold weather. However, I was somewhat encouraged when I saw that club member Morrie Morgan a professional boat deliverer on board "Vamos" was immediately behind us.

Again, I was wrong and 24 hours later, the weather hadn't improved, progress was slow and fuel consumption high, and one of the crew was developing Hypothermia. So we stashed him down below and covered him with whatever we could find that was dry and warm. So much for Happy Days with me now having to stand a watch, be the first aider, cook and make decisions on the boat. Coffs Harbour was tempting but we decided to press on for Newcastle while "Vamos" (Morrie and Leanne) who had blown up a jib took refuge in Coffs.



The wind finally eased and went through to the East. We then took off cruising along at 14knts. Now things settled it was finally time to cook a decent meal. When I did, I discovered that while "Bung" overordered at the restaurant, I would have had to do a "loaves and fishes" (Please see Bible) had we served "normal" sized regular meals. But not longer, after the breeze continued through to the North and continued to ease. So, after four hours of great sailing, on went the donk. This was not going to plan.

With diminishing food and fuel supplies, timetables getting tight and unhelpful breezes we decided to divert to Newcastle. We limped into Newcastle at 3am, in just over 2 days, tied the boat up and headed home for a warm bath.

Would I do it again – No thank you that is what Pro's like Morrie are for! Racing only for me plus Mako deliveries to Sydney.

The Tribunal found that under section 150 and section 139 of the Strata Schemes Management Act 2015, a body corporate's by laws are secondary to the strata law principal that they cannot "prohibitor restrict" the operation of an owner's lot. The Tribunal found that an Airbnb is a lease within the meaning of the Act and that the Dept of Fair Trading and a parliamentary committee examining short term lettings held a similar view. (research ref; stackslaw.com.au)

#### Marine Rescue Unit Commander – Ron Calman

In this edition of Thirty Two Fifty Five I would like to profile our Unit Commander, Ron Calman.

I'm sure many readers will know Ron as he is always about doing work for the unit and many other things for the community.

Where to start was my main issue as Ron has had a long and valued life of volunteering not only for our organisation but Surf Lifesaving, Boy Scouts, Coast Guard and Coastal Patrol and in his professional life, the NSW Police Force.



Ron was born in Victoria in February 1945 where his father was a member of the

Australian Army. In 1954 after living in Bandiana Victoria for some time with the army, the family moved to The Entrance NSW. In about 1957/8 Ron started his volunteering 'career' by joining the Toowoon Bay Surf Lifesaving club at the age of 12. In the late 50's Ron attained the SLSC's Qualifying Certificate and in 1959 the SLSC's Instructor Certificate, which from what I am led to believe are both not an easy accomplishment.



Ron won the Malibu Board event at the 1965 Branch Championships at North Avoca and the following year came runner-up in the Board event at the Central Coast Branch Championships.

In 1966 Ron was made Club Captain of Toowoon Bay. Even after moving away during his police career, Ron returned often to his old club and in 1979 was made a Life Member of the Toowoon Bay SLSC.

In 1967 Ron married Maria who worked at a local café that Ron frequented after SLSC training. Tragedy hit Ron and Maria twice, with their son Craig being stillborn in 1971 and their beloved daughter Sheree, aged 18 years, dying of an aneurism in 1990. Through such loss



and of course many years of happiness, Maria and Ron have been married for over 50 years with no doubt many more years to come.

In October 1966 Ron joined the NSW Police Force training at the old training school in Redfern. After training he was stationed at Hornsby then Pymble and

Brooklyn in General Duties before moving to the North Sydney area as a part of the Special Traffic Patrol.

Ron transferred to Newcastle in 1968 until 1973 also in the Special Traffic Patrol, which amongst other things involved being a motorcycle officer, before being transferred to Belmont as a Highway Patrol Officer until 1979. During Ron's period at Belmont he also took on the role of Acting Traffic Sergeant. During Ron's time on bikes in the Special Traffic Patrol Ron made the news when he was able to grab a young girl who had climbed the safety fence at the Watt Street cliffs. The girl had been reported missing from a local clinic and was returned safely back to the clinic.

Ron was sent back to Newcastle on General Duties for a short time then back to Belmont in General Duties until November 1992 when he was transferred to the Water Police where he remained until his retirement in 2007 after 39 years and 8 months service. As a part of his Water Police duties Ron undertook various external studies where he eventually attained the qualifications of Master Class 5 and Marine Engine Driver Grade 2.



During Ron's long service with the Water Police he was involved in dozens of rescues and general assistance to the boating public.

One rescue that needs mentioning is where Ron was awarded the Commendation for Brave Conduct by the Governor of NSW. On the 20th February 1984, Ron was off duty fishing with another police officer when they



were called back to the Swansea Channel bar to assist a yacht that had run aground in dangerous seas. In trying to tow the yacht to safety, Ron's companion was thrown into the water where his head came into contact with the propeller, causing severe injuries. Ron immediately dived into the water to attempt to rescue his friend. Assisted from time to time by a surfboard rider, they kept the injured police man afloat until after about 40 minutes an inflatable craft took the injured man away. Unfortunately the injured police officer passed away through his injuries. In addition to the bravery award, Ron also received a Bronze Medal from the Royal Humane Society and the Police Commissioners Commendation for Courage.

Another incident certainly worth mentioning was Ron's involvement in setting off in very rough seas to look for the missing four crew members from the 15.2 metre yacht 'Excalibur', which lost its keel east of Seal Rocks in September 2002. Two crew were rescued after hours in the water by a 50,000 tonne bulk carrier however the search for four others did not end as well. In addition to Ron and other water police officers there were many air born assets searching however three of the crew were never found with one deceased man found the next morning still attached to the upturned yacht. Although the weather was severe, police divers were eventually able to inspect the upturned yacht with no sign of the three missing crew. Water police towed the still upturned vessel towards Nelsons Bay however the tow cables separated late in the evening with a recovery of the vessel lost. The vessel was eventually recovered some 300 nautical miles east of Jervis Bay.

One final example of Ron's bravery was in the late 80's/ early 90's Ron and a colleague were involved in saving

a wind surfer in the seas off Belmont where Ron faced nine metre seas in the 12 metre police launch 'Belmont'. Finding the missing man was difficult in the deep troughs so Ron called in the Westpac/2HD rescue helicopter which was able to hover over the man and allow Ron and his colleague to get the windsurfer into the vessel.

Throughout Ron's water



police career Ron always had the community at heart. He did a weekly 'safety' article for a local newspaper, was always available for advice on boating issues and other topics. Ron retired from the police force after almost 40 years' service in July 2007.

Ron's volunteering had not ceased after joining the police force. Ron was instrumental as part of the formation of the Swansea Coast Guard the inaugural flotilla Commander in the mid 1970's and remained with them for a couple of years. He then joined the

Royal Volunteer Coastal Patrol in 1991 however had been associated with the RVCP for many years before through his water police duties via liaison and education duties for its members.

Ron was Divisional Commander of Lake Macquarie RVCP and has also held positions such as Search Master and Training Officer. In 2010 Ron transferred to the Newcastle Unit where to this day he is Unit Commander and Master

A WINDSURFING adventure in mountainous sea off Blacksmiths Beach yesterday afternoon almost ended in tragedy for a young Sydney man after he was swept out to sea.

In the 40-minute ordeal the police launch *Belmont* constantly circled trying to find the windsurfer after the alarm was raised by a relative on the beach.

The crew on the 21m police launch, rocking in the troughs of the giant swell, decided to call in the Westpac/2HD rescue helicopter to help pinpoint the surfer.

The helicopter, hovering above the police launch, managed to spot the man and Const Ron Calman and Sgt Chris Kirksman hauled him aboard Belmont.

Coxswain. As Ron is the only permanent local member who can command our vessel, Ron is on call all week days and nights and every weekend that other coxswains are not on duty. Ron, with help from other members, also looks after the maintenance of our rescue vessel not to mention the administrative duties he is required to do as unit commander, assist with fund raising events and anything else asked of him. Other volunteer work that Ron is

involved in is with the Belmont North Scouts and Cubs where he assists with driving their bus on various trips and also assists as a 'fill in' driver for an elderly citizens group to take them on various outings.

In signing off, I could only touch on some of the highlights of Ron's life. To fully explain it would take the entire magazine. I for one know Ron will be embarrassed by his story being told however this is a story that should be told. The community thank you for your past and ongoing service.

- **1984:** Commendation for Brave Conduct; Commissioners Commendation for Courage; Bronze Medal from Royal Humane Society.

- 1993: Swansea Rotary Club Citizen of the Year.
- 2006: Premier's award for service to the community.
- **2007:** Medal of the Order of Australia (for services to the community through the RVCP)

National Police Service Medal; National Medal with three clasps (total 45 years); NSW Police Medal with 5th clasp (35 years)

Marine Rescue NSW long service medal with 1st clasp (20 years)

#### Dare Devil – A Crew

Member's Perspective

As a skipper I suppose, we have a unique perspective of racing and the project management involved in racing and behind the scenes, whether it be the Blue Water Pointscore, the Sydney to Noumea Race or the pinnacle of all racing; the Rolex Sydney to Hobart Yacht Race.

However, I thought I would ask my crew to start putting forward their point of view, after all, it is a team effort and they too, are individuals who put in an enormous effort and have a unique perspective. I thought to begin with, I would get one of my female crew to give us an insight into the campaign. So, in-light of that, Kim has put together a bit of a summary and a view into her journey on board "Dare Devil":

My original racing yacht from Southport Gold Coast, Aurics Quest, made the decision not to enter the Rolex Sydney to Hobart Yacht Race 2018. Having crewed on the yacht for nearly 2 years in preparation for the race, I now found myself without a boat to do the race on.

I now had the task of looking for another yacht to compete on. My starting point was to look at all last years' competitors from the list of entries.

I was drawn to "Dare Devil", I liked her lines in the water, the name I was immediately drawn to…her performance was good…but she had a female skipper? I had never raced under a female skipper before at this level of race, let alone been a crew member under one?

Having read and watched all the YouTube videos I could find, I then asked around the people I knew on the race circuit. The advice and comments were varied, not all positive, but that didn't deter me; as I was going to make up my own mind if I got offered a crew place.

After harassing Sibby the skipper for several weeks, and messages and missed phone calls, we eventually caught up to talk on the phone. I hoped I would meet Sibbys' criteria for what she was looking for.

I know I am not the best sailor, but I am willing and prepared to learn and improve on what I am lacking. I try never to oversell myself,

as I have sailed with many who do, and are then always found out and come unstuck. Not being ashamed to admit my areas that need more training and learning, I was building my profile to Sibby.

What struck me was her focus and drive, she is very cut and dry, black and white with everything including Sibbys' expectations on how she runs her yacht and what she expects from her crew. If I didn't cut the

commitment and support in all areas, maintenance, pre and post-race boat deliveries and helping with sponsorship searches. A whole package, to me, it's not just about being on board a yacht just for what I wanted out of it and to help me reach my goals.

To me, it is important to know every inch of the boat I race on, where everything is kept, see, watch and learn from the repairs and replacements being done so I know in my own mind these make for a safe boat and crew. This includes the skippers' expectations from me, as a crew member. It's extremely important to me to be 100% committed and have as much knowledge as possible of the rest of the crew both socially and as sailors...know their strengths and weaknesses not in a bad way, but to enable us to make a strong team to sail together.

Sibby, much to my delight accepted me onto her crew after the initial phone call based on the understanding,

that I would be out at anytime if I didn't cut it. As I said ...perfect, quite rightly so. If I can't do my job on board or work within the team, then I shouldn't be there.

Team work plays a huge role in racing, everyone who races is aware of its importance. We cover each other's backs in lots of different

ways. Enjoying the achievements together is a huge feeling of success as a team player and it must be recognised, that it has been a team effort.

Racing on "Dare Devil" with Sibby has been quite a different journey for me. How she runs her crew and boat is very much how I would run my own (if ever I own one!!). The amount of time and expense to enable me to race on "Dare Devil" is massive. But I am reaching my

goal in a sport I love and a passion I follow.

We have several crew members who like myself, spend time, money and commitment to race on "Dare Devil". For me I was travelling by car for an hour and half most weekends to get to race on my Southport yacht ... now I am flying instead of driving!! My stamina and endurance, my sailing ability, my mental and physical ability were being tested, challenging my strengths and weaknesses as a person, really; my whole being....

Sibby respects and allows her crew to reach their goals, encouraging and teaching us as we go. She is a willing and good teacher, if you are open to and want to learn, and respect her as a skipper. Her sailing knowledge is vast, of which I am in ore, and I wish and hope I become half the sailor she is one day! Sibby is open, approachable, clear in all her expectations and how she wants her boat run. If you respect that, then "Dare Devil" will absolutely fly, because the crew and boat will run smoothly, plus the fact Sibby knows her boat, and I mean 'knows' her boat!! So, watch out!!

Sailing on "Dare Devil" is hard work, it's not at all comfortable, working with all your gear on is hard and draining...as with any real race boat.

We sleep in all our safety gear, in wet bunks. I have never raced on such a wet boat, so much water over the bow, both our fore-deckies/bowmen and myself in the pit, are prime targets! Be prepared!

COLD!! I have never been so cold!! Even with 3 sets of thermal layers, mid-layer and outer wet weather gear. A sailing Michelin Man!! (still cold! Be prepared for how it is...harden up buttercup is an understatement for many!!)

BUT I WOULDN'T SWAP IT OR CHANGE IT FOR THE WORLD!!
