Rear Commodore's Report



Three months ago,
Australia was in the grip
of a pandemic that is still not
resolved but we are seeing some
'normality' return in recent
months. This can change in
a moment as we have all seen
recently with the Victorian and
South Australian experience.
There are two silent enemies

here – COVID-19 and complacency. None of us should forget three simple things:

- the disease is still in the community,
- the disease is highly contagious, and
- the disease is fatal for the vulnerable among our community and can cause a lifetime of disability for previously healthy people

When we sail, we have a responsibility to each other to abide by the COVIDSafe practises.

Firstly, I need to make special mention of our Sailing Manager, Jack Buchan, who has been honoured with Australian Sailing's 2020 Yachting Professional of the Year. What an accolade for Jack and our club!

The NCYC board met in our new home at Port Stephens, the NCYC Bay Sailing Centre in November. We have been discussing its usage at both the Board and Sailing Committee. It will be running sailing training and small boat/dinghy regattas in the short term, but we are also discussing plans for Keel Boat use. The first major small boat event will be the A-Class Catamaran Nationals 30 January – 5 February 2021.

Our 'Tackers', Force 24, Elliott, Keel Boat are all back out on the water and in greater numbers. We have increased the Optimist 'Tackers' fleet by four to sixteen

by necessity with all our courses oversubscribed. It is a great problem to have. In November, we held the NCYC conceived, and now national, women's sailing program 'SheSails' Open Regatta. Sailing was conducted right in front of the crowd in the Honeysuckle Hotel.

I'd like to apologise to our Laser sailors for the protracted delay in securing the necessary agreements from all the relevant parties to enable us to sail after our previous facility agreement was not renewed. I am quite frustrated as well; trust me, it's like "herding cats" for Paul and Jack. Anyway, we have become sick of waiting for the needed Thales site permissions. We are constructing a temporary base using the newly purchased hardware within our Marina adjacent to 'F' arm. This will be moved when the approvals are finalised. We hope to be sailing from it within a few weeks – thanks for your patience. Maybe you can lend me some?

As I said above, the Elliott Leagues and Match Racing have started again and are well attended. Be aware that Elliott sails will need to be stored on the boats from March when the clubhouse extensions commence. We have also fitted covers for the boats to protect them.

The keelboat Spring Short Ocean Series has been particularly well attended with 15 regular participants. Both the Twilight and the longer Ocean Pointscore races are also enjoying races with 10-12 boats. All three series are tightly contested.

The Rolex Sydney Hobart looms once again for 'Dare Devil', 'Mako' and 'She's the Culprit'. It's officially a La Niña for December which typically brings cooler temperatures and unsettled weather... good luck to all and stay safe.

Special events continue to be important to our club. We have The Summer Breakout Series in late January, A-Class Catamaran National Titles in February, The

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
Asia Pacific Champions Sailing League in March, and our major annual regatta, SailFest, in April.

Marina & Assets Manager's Report



Welcome to the Summer edition from the Marina team.

The time has again gone so quickly as this article goes to print. It certainly has been an interesting few month and I hope you enjoy reading the news and interesting bits from the Marina team.

With travel restrictions and limitations for many who may usually venture overseas, the boat sales and turnover has been unprecedented. Boat brokers are reporting that they are finding it a challenge to keep boat stock to satisfy the demand. It seems people are buying boats (and caravans) as a means to escape the 'lockdowns' that have kept them in Australia. Of course, this impacts on marina occupancy, with some sold vessels going to new home ports and a handful remaining in Newcastle with new owners.

The 'Blessing of the Fleet' certainly had a different look and feel this year. The global pandemic has impacted events that we have somewhat taken for granted of being 'normal'. All-in-all all participants and marina occupants have been 'blessed'.





The Port of Newcastle has again welcomed delivery shipping from USA and Europe bringing private vessels to Australia. During October, a heavy lift ship, 'Happy Buccaneer', delivered some 245m collectively of vessels. For those that NCYC could accommodate with suitable length berth lengths, for clearances into the country, stayed for at least 4 nights and some longer into the coming summer months. As this goes to print,

we are expecting 3 more delivery ships to offload in Newcastle before the end of December 2020.

For a changeup to this shipping movement, boats arrive from elsewhere to be loaded onto these delivery ships. Often they undergo a quick clean and anti-foul at MidCoast Boatyard before being loaded and leaving Newcastle. Recently one of these small boats arrived with the name 'Enforcer' and left us called 'Sundance Kid'. The story goes that the new owner's partner wasn't fond of the old name. When 'Sundance Kid' left Newcastle enroute to New Zealand, it had some further signwriting done along the Starboard topside. If its not obvious, it was a marriage proposal with the new owner changing the boat name to suit his partner's taste prompting him to ask her to change her name as well. Here's hoping she said yes and he should be commended for his imagination!

Wine Tasting Masterclass

Monday, 16th of November, saw NCYC's inaugural 'Members Wine Tasting' event.

Monday night may not be everybody's cup of tea when it comes to an evening of wine tasting, but it sure didn't put many members off! Both sessions were at capacity!

Hosted by our own in-house Cork Dork, Jay Piper, the evening kicked off with the first session starting at 5.30pm.

Our first masterclass was a focus on aromatic wines, whilst introducing one or two new wines from the new seasons wine list. In the bracket, each guest were given four wines to taste, which were a stunning Riesling from Hentley Farm, SA, a Pinot Gris by Ara, in Marlborough NZ, a Sauvignon



Blanc again from Marlborough NZ, and finally a mystery wine to keep everybody on their toes. The mystery wine was in fact a Grand Cru Gewürztraminer 2017 by Dopff, hailing from the Alsace region in France.

Our guests were given a list of descriptors to identify each wine, and guess the correct order, and bonus points for guessing the variety of the mystery wine.

Many of you came very close, with a couple of guesses such as Traminer Riesling (which is still not unusual to see in 4L boxes!), and Muscat. It's understandable, considering wines from this Region Vs Australian styles, are made more in an off dry to almost sweet, whereas Australian Gewürztraminer are often made bone-dry.

Two of the evenings wines, the Riesling and the Gewürz, were paired with some bite sized canapés from the team the wonderful Nor East Bistro, a chilli, garlic, ginger soy scallop with the Resiling, and a red Thai prawn curry shot for the Gewürz. Coconut and this particular variety of wine acts almost like a flavour multiplier and aromatic wines in general, will often pair well with Asian and South East Asian dishes.

Now for the science... Gewürztraminer can be one of the most easily identifiable grape varieties on the planet, due to the Gewürz's aroma. The first thing to say is that it is very powerful. The smell is heady. Its exact characteristics are probably most accurately compared to the smell of lychees with a big dose of pungent rose petals/Turkish Delight, and, in some of the most concentrated examples, a savoury element. Some tasters will tend to describe the unmistakeable smell of Gewürztraminer as 'spicy' because the word Gewürz means 'spicy' in German, but in fact there is no single spice that is particularly like the smell of Gewürz. Here, 'spicy' was being used as a synonym for 'aromatic'.

Aromatic white wines are unique because they have higher levels of a volatile compound class called terpenes, which include the very same aromas found in flowers! Specifically, aromatic wines have particularly high levels of a subgroup of terpenes called 'monoterpenes,' And monoterpenes are responsible for all of those wonderful aromas of rose petal, orange blossom and geranium! It's thought that these volatile compounds evolved as a way to promote procreation. They would attract insects for pollination and birds for dispersal of seeds.

That's enough science for today! It's time to prepare for the next event! I hope to see you all there!

Sailing Manager's Report

Offshore, we're close enough to be calling it 20 yachts on the water in Wednesday Twilight racing as well as a welcome rise in the division 2 fleet on Sundays adding a great comradeship between competitors. The Ocean Pointscore also welcomed a half-dozen yachts from Port Stephens Yacht Club who joined us for our race up to Soldier's Point in November. We've also started to see a steady increase in enquiries from local residents who used to sail somewhere else a lifetime ago and we're now introducing newcomers to a crew each Wednesday for our offshore twilight races.

Inshore, we've been searching for Newcastle's finest aboard our fleet of Elliott 6m yachts. This year, we've delivered the inshore events as four-week series which included the Youth League, Open League, Women's League, and a Member's Match Racing Tournament. These are still running at the time of writing, but congratulations to all who have participated. There is a bigger focus this year on providing observations and feedback to teams after racing each day to assist with skills development – as well as an Umpire Debrief to discuss any rules related scenarios and why a particular penalty decision was made.

Exciting news for any Laser sailors out there – we are nearing completion of our new Laser storage and launching pontoons at their new home directly in front of the Clubhouse. We will launch in 2021 for the remainder of the sailing season as per the Laser schedule in the Sailor's Handbook. This development has had a lot of wheels in motion that has included relocating parts of the marina, renavigating electrical wiring and plumbing, as well as moving the floating shed bolted to F-arm! The result is now a fully dedicated dinghy pond that will better serve both Lasers and the Tackers learn to sail program.

In the Clubhouse, we've also launched regular Member's Masterclass events with specialists booked in to present topics on Monday nights at the Club. So far these have included ocean racing legend Chris Nicholson on Starting Tactics, International Umpire Damien Boldyrew on an Introduction to Match Racing,

and Youth Academy graduate Emma Jones on Fitness for Sailing. We've got more Masterclass specialists booked in for topics including Weather on the Water, Man Overboard Masterclass, Boat maintenance and rigging and repairs, Blue Water Sailing Preparation, Race Strategy and Tactics, and Diesel Engine Maintenance. There's something for everyone so cross out your Monday Nights and book yourself a seat -Monday Night is Member's Masterclass Night! And in extraordinary news, we're currently in the process of preparing our newly acquired 'Bay Sailing Centre' to open its doors later in December! Our involvement in taking over the Port Stephens Sailing and Aquatic Club venue at Soldier's Point presents opportunities to have a positive impact on increasing the local participation in racing and learn to sail activities. The venue location offers picturesque views from the Clubhouse straight out between Tomaree and Yakaba Headlands. The sandy beachfront the club is located on provides endless rigging and launching area for dinghy classes racing National and World Championship regattas on Port Stephens – a waterway that is free from the challenges of commercial shipping and ferry traffic. No doubt, you'll start hearing a lot more about our new 'Bay Sailing Centre' in the coming weeks.

As we approach the end of the year, I'd like to take a moment to wish good luck (and congratulations) to all of our members that will depart Sydney on Boxing Day and race south to Hobart this year. We'll be following you here at the club and hope the forecasters offer weather predictions somewhat representative of last year's race.

For those not racing to Hobart, consider getting your offshore racing hit with the Breakout Series event. This was originally planned to be earlier in August until local *ahem* 'breakouts' (excuse the pun) caused the event to be postponed. The new schedule will run 18th – 21st January and will hop along the coast from Sydney to Pittwater to Newcastle to Port Stephens – ending with an island passage at Port Stephens on the final day of racing.

In signing off, can we all just give a 'hear-hear' to the entire Newcastle Cruising Yacht Club family. We have a passionate team of staff and volunteers delivering the racing and academy programmes for an enthusiastic family of members and local community. We continue to escalate our ambitions to expand and are constantly rewarded by the enthusiasm and drive of members keen to participate.



With an umpire on the water focusing on the prestart manoeuvring, competitors will partake in a 1 vs 1 match racing round robin across four consecutive Thursday evenings. Keeping an eye on the rules is International Umpire and NCYC member, Damien Boldyrew accompanied by Sydney-based, Erica Kirby who is generously joining us for our midweek twilight competition.

The onwater umpires closely observe boats that are Match racing and accurately issue prompt judgement calls and signals pertaining to whether competitors have broken the rules. In this instance, a penalty may be issued to one (or both) of the competitors.

As we begin to conduct more and more Match racing, we will be calling for any interested members to get involved in applying the rules in an Umpire capacity. Please contact the Sailing Office if you're interested in diving in and getting involved in delivering this unique aspect of our sport.

We have a dedicated and talented team of instructors that work with the Academy and these results are only achieved through their continued efforts. I am so honoured to constantly receive positive and glowing feedback from our participants.

INSTRUCTOR TRAINING & DEVELOPMENT

We are lucky to have Senior Instructor, Andrew Omotosho lead our team and Andrew is also accredited with Australian Sailing to deliver the National Keelboat Program Instructor courses. 
ONLINE MARINE TRAINING COURSES

She Sails Open Regatta 2020

We've just hosted the third edition of the She Sails Open Regatta. In this event, the term "Open" references the fact that the event is open to entries from all-female teams from clubs around the country.

Our first event was in our older fleet of Force 24 training yachts, while the 2019 and 2020 regattas were contested in our newer fleet of Elliott 6m yachts.

This year, Newcastle was represented by six teams - making up nearly half of the entry list. The other teams competing came to us from Lake Macquarie Yacht Club, Royal Prince Alfred Yacht Club, Port Macquarie Yacht Club, Mooloolaba Yacht Club, and last year's winners were racing for the Sailing Women's Network.

Also joining us was the Sailing Manager of Darwin Sailing Club, Kelly Dawson. Here to be a part of the She Sails atmosphere and take back some tips to Darwin for when we can send one of our teams to be a part of their annual women's event.

Australian Sailing's newest Club Services Officer, Gemma Burns, was loving the atmosphere at the home of She Sails - stating "She Sails is an awesome nationwide initiative to promote females in sailing. The vibe here, the racing, it's so good, it's been an awesome regatta and Australian Sailing is so excited that we can be behind this regatta and be a part of supporting it in any way that we can."

Saturday began with our volunteer Race Management Team meeting at 8:00am in the Clubhouse - where they were assigned their jobs for the day and went and prepared their various Start Boats, Mark Boats, Changeover Boats and Repair Boat.

By 8:30am, the mercury was beginning to rise, competitors were strolling through the front door, and our Registration Team were busy welcoming sailors to the club and providing them with their regatta packs and sail numbers in time for the 9:00am briefing.

With thirteen teams attending the regatta, we had more teams than we had boats. Those racing in the first race of the day were guided down to the marina to rig their boats and hit the water, while the remaining teams were ferried to Honeysuckle Hotel - to spectate the racing from the balcony until it was their turn to change into an Elliott and take part in the round robin qualifying series.

As boats hit the water and teams started arriving at the race area, the temperature was well into the 30's and the wind was throwing some surprisingly strong gusts exceeding 20knts at times. Crews were doing their best to drink water and find shade whilst not racing.

The qualifying round robin would see each team participate in three of the six races in the qualifying series. The two changeover boats would move teams between Honeysuckle Hotel and the Elliott yachts as quickly as they could, and the Repair Boat was dedicated to making fast work of any maintenance that would be required between races - including a broken spinnaker pole, torn spinnaker, and a bent shackle on a boom vang control line.

The 'Sailing Women's Network' (SWN) team demonstrated a strong defence of their 2019 victory with wins in both Race 1 and Race 2 - and ending with a fourth place in Race 6. With the support SWN's Deb Wallace accompanying the defending champions, Skipper Elizabeth Borberg was again joined by Jess Tavener, Emma Byrne and India Howard.

In Race 3, Team 'Sinatra' claimed a win for their first race of the day as they came back from placing second overall in 2019. 'Sinatra', representing dual clubs LMYC and NCYC, had Natalie Butterworth on the stick, Tracey Hanson on the main, and Sarah Gamble in the bow.

Race 4 saw Royal Prince Alfred Yacht Club's 'Alfredisiacs' claim a win - with the newly formed team of Nicole Butcher, Lisa Ratcliff, Gemma Rasdall, and Maike Muff.

In Race 5, we were cheering for a young and enthusiastic team representing dual clubs LMYC and NCYC as Nina Tolhurst, Erin Killey, and Grace Buchan sailed under the team name 'Knot Shore' and claimed first place - strengthening their qualifying scorecard with 2, 2, 1 results.

'Sinatra' returned to the water in Race 6 to claim their second win - bringing their scorecard to 1, 3, 1 for the qualifying series.

After six races of the qualifying round robin, we reset the course and and selected the top 8 teams to race a standalone 'Battle for Bubbles' race to end the first day off the regatta. By this stage, the thermostat was sitting on 39°C and the wind was strengthening from the north.

The teams not racing were quickly ferried out to spectator boats generously provided by tenants of the NCYC marina including the homely powerboat 'Home Free' and the stunning Outremer 5X 'Cara Mia' catamaran currently staying in the marina. The two boats provided magnanimous hospitality for the five remaining teams as they followed the action of the 'Battle for Bubbles' race and then returned back to the clubhouse after racing.

The 'Battle for Bubbles' really showed the strength and endurance of the younger teams that were able to continue pushing themselves through the extreme heat as we saw the 'Screaming Jets' come around the first mark in first place ahead of the 'Knot Shore' team and team 'REG' in third. Newcastle Cruising Yacht Club were sitting in first, second and third in the celebratory race of the day - perhaps demonstrating a little bit of local knowledge as well as familiarity with our Elliott 6m yachts.

A number of lead changes downwind with spinnaker mishaps and bottom mark rounding hurdles saw final

results favour the race winners on 'Knot Shore' (Nina Tolhurst, Erin Killey, Grace Buchan) with solid boat handling and leading tactics maintain their position ahead of second placed Sailing Women's Network (Liz Borberg, Jess Tavener, Emma Byrne, India Howard) and third placed Mooloolaba Women's Team (Tanya Kelly, Kristie Hatch, Lori Tyrell, Kerri Smith).

Upon returning ashore, both competitors and our volunteer Race Management Team alike were seeking shelter. Shelter from the sun, the heat and the wind. It was now dangerously hot and wasn't getting any better. With everyone invited to come back for dinner, we ordered

some industrial fans from Coates Hire to combat the heat of the night in the marquee and provided enough ice and water to end a drought!

Dinner was accompanied by guest speaker, Olivia Price, recalling her training notes and giving tips on sailing the Elliott 6 yachts - having practiced and raced on our yachts when they debuted in the 2012 London Olympic Games and won a silver medal. The heat was relentless, but Olivia pressed on and was praised by guests who said they were "impressed by Olivia's energy in such extreme conditions..." and the way she "...was able to keep things at just the right technical level that everybody was able to keep up with the tuition."

On Day 2, we were given another extreme day with the thermostat even hotter and the wind even stronger - gusting over 40knts for most of the day.

Our fate had been sealed. At the 9:00am briefing, it was the responsibility of Sailing Manager 'Captain' Jack Buchan to announce that "We are concerned about the safety of sailors... We saw signs of heat exhaustion yesterday and it is only going to be more extreme as the day goes on... There will be no racing today."

Immediately there was a mix of emotions. There was instant comfort in the realisation that we wouldn't be sending teams out to race in the extreme hot sun, while there was also a sense of sorrow that the She Sails Regatta was prematurely coming to an end. The new schedule would now see the briefing brought forward to 10:00am in the marquee - to be finished before the temperature climbs in excess of 40°C in the marquee.

As described by Olympic silver medallist Olivia Price "It's unfortunate today that we're not out on the water again. Yesterday was a great day on the water and the Race Committee were able to get seven races off the bat so each and every team got to race each other at least once which doesn't always happen at regattas. But the Race Committee did a fantastic job - there was shifty, puffy conditions and I think that it was one of the

hardest days I would have seen on the harbour for a very long time."

Last year's winner Liz Borberg reported that "It was hotly contended this year... but it would have been good to get some more racing today, but I really respect the decision of the race committee. I know it was a tough one."

Mooloolaba Yacht Club's Tanya Kelly recounted that "It was really testing conditions this weekend; it was really hot! There was a hot strong northerly breeze and that gave us some tactical opportunities, but it also made for some really challenging racing."

The only option was to take results from the round robin on Day 1 and the top two teams were tied for first place overall. With both teams dually representing LMYC/NCYC, we proudly watched on as team 'Sinatra' (Natalie Butterworth, Tracey Hanson, Sarah Gamble) were presented first prize after claiming the victory on a count-back leaving team 'Knot Shore' (Nina Tolhurst, Erin Killey, Grace Buchan) in second place. 'Hotly Contested' is the appropriate description here as winning team 'Sinatra' had mum Natalie Butterworth only claiming the equal points tiebreaker ahead of daughter Grace Buchan in 'Knot Shore'.

Sailing Women's Network (Liz Borberg, Jess Tavener, Emma Byrne, India Howard) held onto third place overall followed by fourth placed 'Alfredisiacs' (Nicole Butcher, Lisa Ratcliff, Gemma Rasdall, Maike Muth) tied for points with fifth placed 'Screaming Jets' from NCYC (Mieka Wright, Janease Graham, Peta Norris). In sixth place, NCYC team 'REG' (Rayshele Martin, Georgia Peard, Emma Spiers) came in ahead of seventh placed Mooloolaba Women's Team (Tanya Kelly, Kristie Hatch, Lori Tyrell, Kerri Smith) and Lake Macquarie Yacht Club's team 'Bouyancé' (Susie Wright, Eleanor Cunningham, Kathryn Johnson) in eighth.

Jack Buchan continued "the vibe from the water was elating - the "ooooh's" and "wooaaaah's" when boats were on the edge of rounding up gave us a sense of excitement and the cheers and applause from the onshore crowd when boats crossed the finish line were inspiring for each of the teams finishing after another tough race in the unrelenting heat."

"I turned to Simon who was in the Repair Boat with me and I remember asking - this just makes your heart feel all warm and fuzzy doesn't it?!" There was an aura of positive energy and togetherness surrounding everyone both ashore and afloat and I think that this feeling - the passion and warm-hearted atmosphere that the She Sails Regatta creates - is perhaps the MOST universally agreed upon feedback we receive about our She Sails events.


I can't wait to see the entry list grow over the next 12 months and watch as the list of Clubs (and States) represented by all-female teams continues to expand."

'Dare Devil' Competing in 2020 Sydney to Hobart

What a turbulent year it has been, and irrespective of our political convictions and understanding of this mysterious virus COVID-19, we have all been affected in some way by this year's events. Most of our businesses have taken a hit, and certainly sailing has been affected in more ways than one.

Border closures and infectious disease measures and controls have seen most major races cancelled and other events strictly regulated. This has been hard for those of us who depend on sailing as an 'out', a relief of sorts, especially if business is not going as planned.

In March we started getting excited about the Sydney to Noumea Race. However, by the time May came around, we realised that the restrictions and the health directives would put an end to any plans.

In our Sydney to Hobart preparation, we have had to overcome some challenging obstacles due to COVID, the greatest one being that the majority of the crew have been restricted to their states due to border closures and/or limitations imposed on them by their employers.

Whilst we are very competitive, safety is always the primary concern on 'Dare Devil.' We spend months going over every system and double checking everything on board. One of the primary objectives of 'Dare Devil Racing' is to make ocean racing available to a wider range of people, irrespective of their previous sailing experience. This has posed some special challenges, as not everyone wanting to participate in the project, has sufficient offshore and Cat 1 experience to meet the stringent qualifying criteria.

This has meant that we have needed to schedule a 500nm Cat 1 qualifying journey, as well as the training sails around the CYCA Audi Sydney Centre Blue Water Pointscore. The aim is to always meet the highest level of safety benchmarks, rather than meet the minimum requirements.

Another objective this year has been to get more women involved in this sailing project: To developing women's sailing skills, resilience, and leadership in a challenging environment. We had planned to spend time training in nighttime helming, down-wind helming and some of the more challenging crew positions, which have been traditionally male roles. This is appropriate as 2020 celebrates the 75th year of women competing in the Sydney to Hobart Race. Again, we had to modify and adapt our plans due to COVID restrictions.

The training sails have also involved races from the NCYC calendar – focusing on such things as reefing procedures, emergency procedures and endurance. The NCYC Bird Island Race proved to be a challenging one, with winds up to 38 kts and close-hauled sailing in sloppy seas with swells up to 4 meters. Sea sickness has been an issue on a number of occasions, and we have worked with crew members on ways to minimize this. The entry numbers were low in the Bird Island Race, and only 3 boats finished, 'Dare Devil' being one of them. The team however embraced the challenges, loved the experience and gained a lot from it.

December, will see 'Dare Devil' in Sydney at the CYCA, doing maintenance and training as well as some corporate activities. This will give others an opportunity to participate.

We have some very experienced crew on board with some of our crew and myself having competed in seven Sydney Hobarts as well as other challenging races. We

have the two Peters and Karl, each with two Hobart races. We have another crew member, who competed in the CYCA Bird Island Race with us, who has also completed two Hobart races. We are all feeling very comfortable with the ability of the crew and the boat preparation. This is very important. I would not leave the dock, unless I knew we all felt totally comfortable with where we are at.

It is nice to see, that irrespective of this year's challenges, at closing of entries, there are 100 boats planning to compete in this year's Sydney to Hobart Race. We wish all competitors a rewarding and speedy race.


We love how well designed it is from the way all control lines come to the cockpit and helm position, to how

I would also like to give a big thank you to NCYC on behalf of the entire Unit for all that they do for us over the year.

FLOATING BERTH FOR NC30

For those who read our article each edition will be aware Marine Rescue Newcastle received our new rescue vessel earlier in the year. To date the 10 metre Naiad has served extremely well in all conditions. However, to protect its hull from marine growth and to prevent having to use anti-fouling chemicals to help prolong the life of the vessel, we required a floating berth. As these are a costly bit of kit, Marine Rescue Newcastle started looking for any organisations in the Newcastle area that might be able to assist with sponsoring the purchase.

We are extremely pleased to announce that Port Waratah Coal Services came to our rescue and have been kind enough to not only help with some of the costs but the entire \$27,500.00.

Thank you to PWCS for their kind assistance.

The berth we will be buying is an 11.5 metre Marinescape Dry Berth which will be in place as soon as possible. Hopefully, we can add pics of the new setup in the next edition.

UPDATE ON OUR NEW BASE AT STOCKTON
