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Commodore's Message



The New Year saw the end of a very successful summer sailing season. Division 1 yachts fought out a very competitive series in both short and long ocean series. Congratulations must go to John Streeter, skipper of The Raging Bull for "scooping the pool" in this division. Division 2 was down on numbers from previous years however the competition was

keen with Robin Hillery's Warrain and Ross Knights Tamarillo coming away with boasting rights for the season. This Division will be stronger in the winter and subsequent seasons with new yachts joining the fleet.

The winter season started mid-May and those crews keen enough to face the brisk winter weather were looking forward to getting back after a short autumn break.

We are in the process of reviewing our options and this may include making representation to the State Government to plead our case. I will update members and tenants further as this matter progresses.

A number of marina berth lessees have raised the question of renewing leases as we get closer to the expiry of the original leases. This matter has been under regular review by the Board and I wish to inform members that a policy on this matter will be put to members at a meeting to be held in late 2016 which is approximately 12 months prior to the expiration of the first marina berth leases.

Please enjoy the facilities of your Club during winter. I know Chef Bill and his team have some interesting menus in mind to compliment these colder months.


From the Sailing Office Visiting Sailors Sing their Praises of NCYC



Hit list for the annual lift

Come time for the annual lift for inspection and maintenance of underwater parts, it's good practice to have a bit of a hit list ready for yourself to do DIY, or to arrange for the work to be carried out by the boat yard.



Procedure once lifted

While the underwater area is

still wet it should be cleaned with a high pressure water hose and any solid growth should be scraped off.

Then the hull should be visually inspected checking all through hull fittings: running gear; anodes and; the condition and adhesion of antifoul (blistering or bubbling under the paint). Note any abnormalities and seek professional advice if needed.

The hull should be thoroughly sanded with "wet and dry" paper wearing appropriate protection. Never dry sand as the dust is highly toxic. Be sure to remove the underwater grates and scrape out the thru hull fittings to remove growth.

Underwater mechanical components should be serviced ie props and shafts/sail drives/ stern legs etc.

Apply masking tape along the waterline in preparation for antifouling.

Tips when antifouling

The antifoul can be applied by roller, or professionally by spray which gives a more even and smooth finish subject to how well the surface has been prepared.

Because some brands are not compatible, it is important that the same antifoul as previously used, is applied to inside the through-hull piping as well.

A hard antifoul should not be applied over a soft antifoul.

There are specific areas which should be coated with a different antifoul that does not have constituents that affect the metals. These areas are: Running gear (propellors, shafts, saildrives, sternlegs) and approx a 400mm square of the hull around the saildrive. This sometimes includes a similar area of the hull around the rudder on yachts (depending on what material the rudder stock is made of). Intake grates can be antifouled all over and refitted, and anodes replaced. In all cases with antifoul, seek professional advice if unsure.

If you are going to polish your hull topsides

It is recommended that it be done either before you start preparing the under-hull area, or the very last job before launching. This is because polish contains silicon which is the number one enemy of any boatyard painter. It prohibits the adhesion of the paint. If the boat is polished first the silicon is sanded and washed off in the "wet and dry" preparation and process. If polished last the silicon will not affect the paint that is already applied.

There are some very good silicon based antifoul systems

for running gear on the market now. However, these products rely on the rotation of the propellors at least every two weeks to work most efficiently. If you do not use your boat on a regular basis seek

professional advice as to which product is best suited to your needs.

Take care on the waterways and enjoy your time on your boat.

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2011 EMYR Crusade

Edition IV – Jerusalem to Jordan Len Griffin & Ian Harper

On leaving Haifa in the north of Israel we had another regimented journey down to Ashkelon in the south of Israel, 5 km north of Gaza. The only incident was the Australian 4th Dimension diving team helping our English friends on the yacht 'Shady Lady' by cutting away a builders bulk goods bag from their propeller. Like so many of the marinas we had recently visited, the Ashkelon Marina doesn't get many visitors so the arrival of 50 yachts was quite an event. There was a band and drinks supplied as we tied up. That night another formal function was laid on for us with local dignitaries and more food and drinks. Flags representing the 16 countries in the rally were again paraded and raised on stage.

Helicopter gunships were a constant sight travelling up and down the coast however they assured us how safe it was there because the rockets from Gaza flew further north, well above this area. We discussed trying to get to Gaza but we had already ignored too many government travel warnings so we thought that was pushing it a bit too much.

One day trip took us to Masada, the amazing desert mesa rising above the Dead Sea and site of the last defiant stand of the Jewish zealots against the Romans in AD66. 'Masada shall not fall again' is the oath now repeated at IDF (Israeli Defence Force) swearing in ceremonies held here. This was followed by a float in the Dead Sea. Another trip was a special day wandering around the political and religious conundrum that is Jerusalem where Judaism, Christianity and Islam have been writing their own versions of history.

With friends from England we left the fleet to Egypt and took a side trip to Jordan. We caught the local bus south through the Negev desert to the border with Jordan at Eilat. After a brief walk through two immigration stations and 'no-man's land' we entered Jordan and arrived in a deserted carpark.

Fortunately our driver/guide for the next three days arrived an hour later. We then drove through the desert for a few hours to our Bedouin camp near Wadi Rum (the film site of the Lawrence of Arabia). The tents were adequate, but dinner and Bedouin dancing (a male thing).

The next day was a 4WD tour through Wadi Rum in the open back of a 1973 Land Rover (the modern camel) and, as we found out after three hours of driving, it didn't come with a spare tyre or a jack... "These things cost extra!" Our driver mumbled that he knew a friend who could help and ran off over the sandhills. There wasn't much around so we wondered how long we would be here. Then, like out of some strange movie scene, about an hour later we spot the dust rising in the distance and another Land Rover, of equal vintage to ours, pulls up and our driver and a wheel emerged. No tools though, but with a bit of clever Bedouin desert engineering involving rocks as a jack we are moving again. A complete engineering description would require a full article.

Our desert driver/guide was not only a clever bush engineer but freely shared his life story about his way of living and surviving in this harsh environment. We even met his favourite camel along the way. We were surprised when he told us he was very disappointed to

learn that Australians wanted to kill camels. Apparently it was reported on the internet that Australia had, that day, proposed a plan to cull camels in central Australia because of the feral numbers affecting the environment. We weren't that remote!

Petra was our next stop. We stayed in a 200 room hotel and the 6 of us were close to being the only guests. The effects of the 'Arab spring' had drastically affected tourism across the Middle East but with the escalating situation in Syria to the north, tourism in Jordan was non-existent. The ancient city of Petra is a huge complex and so much more than the immediately recognisable treasury building. We had one day there but could have easily spent two more. It should be well up on anyone's bucket list.

We travelled back to Aquaba in the south for our last night in Jordan before crossing the border back to Eilat and a bus trip back to Ashkelon.

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Cruising to Hobart 2011

"Woodstock" was entered in the 2011 MyState Australian Wooden Boat Festival

I need to give a brief description of the mostly idyllic passage Newcastle to Hobart so that you have some understanding of the choice I made later, the result of which will be the subject of my next article.

The whole regular crew of 'Woodstock' would have loved to share the experience of an ocean passage to the Australian Wooden Boat Festival in Hobart. For most of them work and family commitments just didn't allow it to happen. In the end I skippered a crew of two, Stewart Wheeler and Jon Boer. How Jon managed to get away to join us we are not quite sure! He and Janinna had just married.

All this time later, I still can't get over Jon's solo 'saila-moon'. Jon and Janinna's honeymoon consisted of the car trip to Ulladullah, one night raising up a storm with the Woodstock crew at the local Thai restaurant then a shared carton back on the wharf with a local fisherman and his dog 'Rastus'. The groom continued the honeymoon on his own sailing aboard 'Woodstock' to Hobart. The understanding and tolerant bride Janinna returned by car to Newcastle!

The passage was uneventful until between Tasman Island and mainland Tasmania. There, we found ourselves dodging crayfish pots – not an easy job when the wind came up to about 50 knots in 5 seconds causing 'Woodstock' to do a nasty Chinese Jibe. When we eventually anchored in the shelter of Stewart Bay, it took quite a few beers to help us unwind!!

For those interested in cruising this coastal passage I am providing the Course we followed once leaving Ulladulla. A little sleepover in Bermagui and then across Bass Strait. We took a shortcut through Schouten Passage, to Coles Bay where we stayed overnight. Deciding to avoid the Dunally Canal, we overnighted at Prosser Bay before taking the shortcut we wished we hadn't. Once passing between Tasman Island and Mainland Tasmania we gratefully anchored in Stewart Bay for a much needed overnight stopover. Then Storm Bay, to Hobart and berthed at Derwent Sailing Club to wait for Berth at Constitution Dock when the festival started.

The Wooden Boat Festival in Hobart was a wonderful experience with Woodstock being one of only two NCYC boats to be entered into the event. The first entries from this Club since the inaugural event in 1994.

Supporting Junior Sailing in the Hunter Region



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News from Newcastle

Port Corporation

Sponsoring a portside school to improve its environmental imprint

Students at Carrington Public School will be saving water every time they go for a drink thanks to sponsorship from Newcastle Port Corporation for installation of new water-saving bubblers.

School Principal, Teeny Blatchford, said the eight bubblers were high on the list of priorities for the environmentally conscious school and its students.

"Newcastle Port Corporation has been sponsoring our participation for the past four years in the ClimateCam for Schools program which tackles reduction in water and energy consumption," said Teeny.

"As part of the program, our students have been working to achieve eight gold stars but the installation of 3-star water saving bubblers has been slightly difficult because of costs.

"Newcastle Port Corporation heard about our problem and its offer of an additional \$3,000 sponsorship to its ClimateCam agreement to buy and install the bubblers is greatly appreciated."

Students at Carrington Public School have so far achieved six gold ClimateCam stars for energy and water monitoring, waste recycling, trees for carbon, rainwater tanks, dual flushing toilets and an environmental management plan.

CEO of Newcastle Port Corporation, Gary Webb, said the water saving bubblers dispense water on a timer system and will reduce water consumption when operated by a student.

"The eight bubblers will be a great advantage for the school as they will not only reduce water consumption, but also the water bill," said Gary.

"Newcastle Port Corporation is very pleased to be able to assist a school that has been working hard to improve its environmental footprint.

"Once the bubblers are installed the Carrington students will focus on 'smart lighting' to attain their eighth and final ClimateCam star."

ON THE BRIDGE with Paul McGrath

Solution: With such fabulous trumps there is a temptation to immediately draw trumps but this would be a losing strategy. Can you see why? One of the things a skipper should do when embarking on a sailing venture is to plot the course to be negotiated – are there any reefs to be avoided or is it likely that unfriendly vessels may be lurking. In bridge terms this means counting your tricks. You can take five trumps tricks and three hearts tricks. You need two more tricks and they can come only from ruffs (trumping losers). So, win the lead in hand and lead a club immediately – do not draw any trumps or your vessel may be dashed on the rocks of uncertainty. South will win and return another trump. Win in hand and ruff a club in dummy. Return to hand with a heart and ruff your last club. Now your trick tally will come to ten and you will reach your destination untroubled.



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Turkish holiday - part l

If you want to sail, go to Bodrum

In September 2011 Margaret and I had three weeks in Turkey, the last being in Istanbul for a Medical Congress.

Like all Aussies we had a need to go to Gallipoli where my great Uncle and Margaret's Grandfather served. After that we had time to travel further.

Lonely Planet lists 18 "Top Experiences" in Turkey. Sailing the coast and islands of the south east Aegean Sea appealed the most. We booked a Gulet, a traditional Turkish sailing boat as recommended by Lonely Planet.

It took us nearly two days to drive from Gallipoli to Bodrum to join the boat, but we were distracted by visits to Troy, Pergamum and best of all, Ephesus of biblical fame. It is an absolutely beautiful town located at the south west corner of Turkey. It is a mixture of the old, including the largest Crusader Castle built, looming over the harbour, some ancient Greek and Roman remnants and a modern town that we were told rivals St Tropez in the French Riviera. There is a real sense of opulence, modern clothing and a harbour packed with gulets, modern yachts, power boats and a few commercial vessels such as ferries. The castle houses an amazing maritime archaeological museum packed with salvage from lost Egyptian Phoenician, Greek, Roman and Mediaeval vessels.

We could hardly believe our eyes when we saw the Gulet that had been hired for just the two of us. It is 27 metres (90 feet) long, has a crew of three and an interpreter/ guide. There was a skipper, a cook/ seaman and a seaman.

We had a massive cabin in the bow and a small cabin each to use as a dressing room. The guide had her own cabin in the stern.

It was air conditioned and the fit out was all mahogany with the best craftsmanship that I have seen. Gulets are traditional woken beamy vessels with lots of deck space,

that are two masted, both schooners and ketch rigged but we did see a few single and triple masted vessels. All are carvel planked. They have a wheel. I did not see a tiller. These days they are all motor sailors. Ours was powered by two 400 hp Caterpillar diesel engines. I can't remember how much fuel she carried, but it was a lot, and 5 tons of fresh water.

"Arielle" was large and luxurious with a full time crew on standby for the owner, a Turk who lives and works in Germany. He and his friends are not really interested in sailing, but use it as a floating accommodation and transport to beautiful places. He lets it for a few weeks a year to make it look like a business. It, like the majority of the others is registered in Delaware, USA, for tax reasons. We also saw other surprising registrations such as Zurich, Switzerland.
