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#### NCYC - Our Club

#### Newcastle Cruising Yacht Club Founders Day

In 1993, Honeysuckle Development Corporation (HDC) called for expressions of interest for the establishment of a recreational marina in the port. Newcastle Cruising Yacht Club (NCYC) was formed on February 8, 1994 with the aim of tendering to construct a community based club, repair yard, commercial centre and 200 berth marina.

Board Members elected were: Commodore Paul Hannan, Vice Commodore Tom Michilis, Rear Commodore Bruce Hansen, Club Captain John Fisher, Treasurer Bill Rock and Directors Jim Holley and Joe Abraham. Paul Anicich was appointed Honorary Solicitor and George Keegan was subsequently appointed as Secretary.

Some years of planning and negotiating with HDC followed and in 1999, the year that the Port of Newcastle was to celebrate its 200th Anniversary and HDC had still not given us the final approval, I released a media statement highlighting the importance of the development to the region.

In it I emphasised a number of important factors in our proposal, notably that:

- The founders of NCYC were a group of dedicated people from the region including experienced sailors, business people and yacht club administrators.
- The development would provide tourism, sporting and economic and employment opportunities.



- It would address a serious safety issue in that Newcastle is the only all-weather port between Sydney and Coffs Harbour and has no facilities for mooring of smaller craft.
- Furthermore, the founders of NCYC believe that in realising the goals set out in our proposal we would positively contribute to the lifestyle and culture of our region. not only showcase to the world the wonderful playground we have in the waters off Newcastle, but also be a 'significantly prominent and visible asset to the City of Newcastle.'

#### • Parade

circumstances require. The 2005 parade featured over fifty water craft including: yachts, power boats and working vessels. The latter group comprised fishing trawlers, a barge, a vessel from NSW Maritime, a pilot cutter and the Royal Volunteer Coastal Patrol vessel. The Newcastle ferry took advantage of the opportunity to be blessed as did the Svitzer Marine tug prior to its "water ballet" demonstration.

#### • The Blessing of the Fleet

The Chaplains to the Port of Newcastle are based at The Mission to Seafarers Newcastle.




#### Introducing Sandy Hapgood



#### MEMBER PROFILE Greg Jackson



CYC member Greg Jackson was born in Lithgow where he spent his first few years. After moving to Stockton he attended the local Primary School before taking on the daily ferry commute to Newcastle Junior High. At the age

of fourteen Greg started work as a labourer. This was followed by approximately eight years of employment by a tyre company. The bulk of Greg's working life has been as a truck driver, mainly about and between Newcastle and Sydney, with a three year interval of interstate driving.

Growing up, Greg took part in just about any sport going: running, athletics, swimming, football and of course, surfing. Interestingly, He didn't take up sailing until much later, after joining the Port Hunter Sailing Skiff Club as an official. His role involved safety work for the racing, and serving on the Catamaran Division Committee for a few years. Greg sailed for a while with Cathy Holmes on her Hoby 18, but being more interested in driving boats than sailing them, went back to being safety boat crew.

Greg also speaks about regularly participating in the

"Water Users" meetings approximately 20 years ago. "They were run by Maritime, Water Police and the Port Stephens Council. The area they covered was from Newcastle Harbour to Raymond Terrace and to Port Stephens. The meetings let individual water users as well as various clubs, raise safety issues which concerned them. Discussion then worked out ways of fixing the problems. Some of the problems were things like: boats going too fast in restricted zones; anchoring in the Harbour shipping channel; young people putting oil on roads near boat ramps so they could do better and bigger burn-outs; driving boats through the river's designated water ski area while racing was taking place."


When asked how he became involved with volunteering at NCYC, Greg responded: "I skippered the PHSSC Safety boat when it was borrowed by NCYC for the first major Etchell Regatta run by NCYC. I enjoyed it so I had a talk with Ernie Thirkell who was in charge of the Club boats and volunteers at the time. I asked if he would like another volunteer for the NCYC Committee Vessels and ended up being the usual driver for the George Keegan. In association with this, for a number of years I helped Ernie with the maintenance of our Committee Vessels."

Greg's skill as a photographer was appreciated by all. Apart from being displayed on the monitor in the club, his sailing photos have been used for some of the cover pages of NCYC's "thirty two fifty five" Journal and have appeared on a regular basis throughout many issues. On a couple of occasions he has also helped out by volunteered his time and skill as the Official

photographer for our "Presentation of Trophies and Prizes" evenings.

Greg has largely retired from his NCYC volunteer role in order to spend more time exploring Australia. In his fifth wheeler, Greg has travelled from Cape York Peninsular to the bottom of Tasmania. "In July 2017 I will be camping in the Simpson Desert for the Birdsville "Big Red Bash" before I go to the rock and then north again up past Cairns." Greg still maintains a high social profile around the Club when having a respite from his travels.

Greg's regular participation in social aspects as well as his skills as a boat driver/crewman and as a photographer have been greatly appreciated by our members and in particular, the Sailing Committee and sailors. The years of dedication to his Club have, like those of so many of our other volunteers past and present, been central to the success of Newcastle Cruising Yacht Club.

#### Tale 2: The Snapper we put back

As I have said in a previous article, Our favourite boating ventures these days are to Broughton Island. The surrounding water is full of crevices, reefs and



In 17 years we have learnt a lot about looking after our fish. Nowadays we would use hands to hold it for a photo

bomboras which are home to our favourite fish, the Snapper. On one particular day while we were drifting off Esmerelda Cove Darrell had a huge tug on his line. When he got the fish up enough to see colour I saw it was an enormous Snapper. The fish had a massive hump on its head, (hyperostosis).


Its eyes were huge and I could see it

following my movements. Because we had never caught anything like this before, we decided to take photos and let him go. We assumed it was what they call "an old man snapper" and this one must have been really old!!!

Luckily we stayed to watch the fish swim away after I gently laid it back into the water. It apparently had what they call a barotrauma which means his swim bladder was so inflated that the fish was belly up. I had recently read about this in a Government recreational fishing article. The advice was to deflate the swim bladder with a needle ('venting'). Realising that I needed to act quickly I picked the fish up and vented him by inserting a tube just beside its pectoral fin. When I heard the air escaping from its swim bladder I knew that it had worked. We gently placed the Snapper back in the water and feeling relieved, watched it swim down to the bottom. We were relieved that it would be able to protect itself from predators by hiding in the crevices and weed.

# Sailors with disABILITIES is coming to Newcastle in September

Sailors with disABILITIES (SWD) will hold its annual Northern Campaign, a series of sailing programs for children with disabilities, between July and September. The yacht which has been modified for people with disabilities and is crewed by volunteers, will stop in Mackay, Rosslyn Bay, Southport, Coffs Harbour and Newcastle.

This year SWD will berth at Newcastle Yacht Club for two weeks from Monday 18 to Friday 29. During that time, SWD will welcome on board over twenty groups of children with disabilities from schools across



Newcastle. We are seeking volunteers who can help on board for those two weeks and we would love it if you would jump on board with us.

Kath Veel, volunteer Skipper for the Northern Campaign in Newcastle, said, "It is a highlight of the SWD calendar for us volunteers. Students respond with such excitement and anticipation. We often see familiar faces returning and telling us what they've learned in the last year and trying something new this year."

Last year, SWD ran Winds of Joy programs in Newcastle, sailing out of Newcastle Yacht Club. SWD spoke to some of the teachers from Newcastle High School who told us about their students' experiences:

"They loved it. It allowed the frightened children to push themselves in a nurturing environment. They didn't see crew as people with disabilities and they don't see themselves as people with disabilities. It was nice for them to see people with disabilities doing exciting stuff and for that to be normal. It was very empowering."

"One girl who is very anxious didn't want to go. She said she didn't think she could do it. But within fifteen minutes she was walking all over the boat. She loved it and her squeals of delight were priceless. This is a girl who wouldn't come to the movies and now she was happily going up the bow."

# Sitting in the hot seat of the harbour

The boom in the inner west of Newcastle CBD encompassing the Throsby Basin, Carrington, Wickham and surrounds continues to grow. Being so closely associated and involved directly in

this area for the last



40 years both socially and professionally in Real Estate and Development, I have always seen the appeal of its harbourside location and proximity to the city, now it seems the rest of the market has caught wind. Figures released by the NSW Valuer General recently show that Newcastle's residential land values surged 13 per cent in 2016, with newly trending suburbs like Carrington, Maryville, Islington and Wickham driving much of the growth. These traditionally working class

Certain streets in both Carrington and Wickham experienced one of the biggest jumps in the entire Hunter region with land values in these specific

areas rising a whopping 35 per cent each. If you are fortunate enough to be sitting on property in one of these harbourside catchments, you are sitting in the hot seat of the Hunter property market.

As the previously industrial face of these suburbs has changed, so



has its appeal. It is the not only the naturally beautiful location it enjoys close to the water, it is the proximity and walking distance to beaches, to shopping and it is the vibe stimulated by a new generation of home owners and investors. Wickham, Carrington, Islington and Mayfield are considered the place to be and to be seen and is certainly not limited to age or profession, we have

race was wrapped up with Doug Coulter's "Shakti" taking home 1st place in all divisions including Line Honours, PHS, IRC and ORCi..! Newcastle based "Concealed Weapon" took 2nd place in PHS, and the crew of "Ignition" were congratulated for 3rd place in PHS, 2nd place in IRC and 2nd place in ORCi.

Behind the scenes, it is the efforts of volunteers in all activities who make a significant contribution to the overall abilities of the Club's on-water operations. On the evening before the Newcastle to Port Stephens race we had a team of volunteers at the Club well into the



night assisting boats who were arriving in preparation for the race north to Port Stephens the next day. Meanwhile we also had the Pittwater to Newcastle race finishing on the Harbour as well – meaning that we also had some of NCYCs renowned Rum Runners delivering their 'goods' to the arriving competitors!

Representing the Club at the Sail Port Stephens regatta this year were competitors aboard "Anger Management", "Nyssa", "Scots Wha Hae", "Schouten Passage", "Scuffy", "Summer Salt", and "Young N Old" — with weather improving throughout the week and ending with an almost perfect weekend to finish the regatta.

We are now well into the Winter Short Ocean Pointscore and with a few exciting races starting the season off this year it will be interesting to see who comes out on top!


Seafarers as we care for seafarers in 200 ports in around 50 countries, including here in Newcastle.


